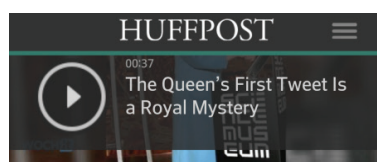

It came as she passed a technological milestone yesterday by tweeting her first message on the micro-blogging site to her followers.

Herts student eSafety survey

Would you like to know what your children get up to on the internet? Hertfordshire County Council created a short survey for children in Years 5 to 13, about their internet use. This anonymous survey has now been completed and the results were published in January 2015. Interestingly, almost half of respondents (the majority were in Key Stage 2) played games online and made contact with people they did or didn't know, and 60% used a webcam to chat with their friends. <http://www.thegrid.org.uk/eservices/safety/news/#children>



Keeping children and young people safe online and teaching them about the appropriate and responsible use of the internet is an essential part of a school’s safeguarding role.
