CHILDWISE Monitor Report

This annual survey of children's media use, brand attitudes and purchasing habits identifies some interesting trends which most schools will recognise!

- **More than six in ten 5-16 year olds own their own PC or laptop**, with around one in ten claiming to have their own iPad
- **More than half of all 7-16 year olds can access the Internet in their own room**, up from just a fifth in 2005
- 7-16 year olds using the Internet do so on average for around **two hours a day**
- **Facebook** and **YouTube** remain the top favourite websites

eSafety and Data Security Policies

These Hertfordshire model policies have been reviewed and updated.
