The report compares the data collected from your pupils with those from a larger, wider sample.



Introduction

The Health-Related Behaviour Survey, developed by the Schools Health Education Unit, is designed for young people of primary and secondary school age. The surveys have been developed over 30 years by health and education professionals, and over a million school children have taken part. In the last ten years, over four thousand schools and colleges have participated. Data arising from the survey can be used to inform planning decisions as well being used in the classroom as the stimulus for discussion with young people.

This report should ideally be studied with reference to the original questionnaire and the survey results tables. The first is recommended because we may have paraphrased a question below for reasons of space, and the precise wording and position may be important for interpretation.

Preceding this report you should have received **The Survey Results Tables** (or online results), which contain more information than can be summarised here. You may want to refer to this if you want to look in more detail at the results of a particular question. The Survey Results Tables show the number of responses received for each question, which may be less than the total sample. Also in the Results Tables we show the results of each response for multiple-choice questions, whereas in this report answers may be selective or grouped.

A school's results are confidential and will not be shared with other organisations without the express permission of the school.

Additional services (graphs and discs) are available; please contact SHEU. In particular, we have designed a set of INSET workshops around different examples of using the questionnaire data. If you would like further details of these or have any comments on this report please contact us at the address on the front of the report.

Comparison figures

If the figures in your survey have been compared with results from a reference sample, the reference figures are normally given second, and often in parentheses.

Throughout the report we make references to our national/aggregate figures. All such figures come from our publication "Young People into..." series. This is our annual report collating information from our surveys from the previous year. For further details please contact the Unit directly.

Background

ETHNICITY

- 75% (76%) of pupils responded that they are White British.

HOME LIFE

- 48% (66%) of pupils responded that they live with their mum and dad together.
- 17% (16%) of pupils responded that they live 'mainly or only' with their mum, while 4% (2%) said they live 'mainly or only' with their dad.

SPECIAL NEEDS

- 0% (0%) of pupils responded that someone helped them fill in the questionnaire, while 2% (1%) said they were 'not sure' if they did and 0% (0%) didn't want to say.
- 2% (2%) of pupils responded that they have a physical disability, while 2% (1%) said they are 'not sure' if they do and 0% (0%) didn't want to say.
- 10% (12%) of pupils responded that they have a long-standing illness, while 10% (3%) said they are 'not sure' if they do and 2% (0%) didn't want to say.
- 8% (7%) of pupils responded that they have a special educational need or learning difficulty, while 2% (6%) said they are 'not sure' if they do and 0% (1%) didn't want to say.
- 4% (5%) of pupils responded that their school helps them enough with their additional needs, while 2% (2%) said they are 'not sure' if they do and 4% (6%) said they don't have any needs like that.
- 13% (8%) of pupils responded that they care for someone at home who has a serious illness or disability.

RELIGION

- 15% (20%) of pupils responded that they are a practising member of a religion, while 9% (5%) said they are 'not sure' if they are.

Healthy Eating

CONTROL OVER HEALTH

- 85% (91%) agreed with at least one statement about being in control of their health (Q9a&c).
- 66% (49%) agreed with at least one statement saying that they weren't in control of their health (Q9b&d).
- 67% (77%) of pupils responded that they are in charge of their health, while 60% (45%) said that

even if they look after themselves, they can still easily fall ill.

LUNCH

- 48% (38%) of pupils responded that they had school food for lunch on the day before the survey, while 31% (43%) said they had a packed lunch from home.
- 15% (12%) of pupils responded that they didn't have any lunch on the day before the survey.

BREAKFAST

- 21% (10%) of pupils responded that they didn't have anything for breakfast on the day of the survey, while 8% (5%) had a cooked breakfast.
- 10% (8%) of pupils reported only having a drink for breakfast.

WEIGHT AND DIETING

- 46% (49%) of pupils responded that they 'never' or only 'sometimes' consider their health when choosing what to eat.
- 29% (23%) of pupils responded that they 'very often' or 'always' consider their health when choosing what to eat.
- 4% (9%) of pupils responded that they would like to put on weight.
- 56% (44%) of pupils responded that they would like to lose weight.
- 40% (46%) of pupils responded that they are happy with their weight as it is.
- 65% (41%) of pupils responded that they worry 'quite a lot' or 'a lot' about the way they look.
- 13% (9%) of pupils responded that they are not provided with food at school that meets their religious, cultural or medical dietary needs.
- Of the 13 (459) pupils who eat school meals and indicated that they have specific dietary needs, 46% (35%) said they aren't met.

WATER

- 6% (8%) of pupils responded that they didn't drink any water on the day before the survey.
- 42% (39%) of pupils responded that they drank at least 'about a litre' of water on the day before the survey.

5-A-DAY

- 4% (7%) of pupils responded that they didn't eat any portions of fruit or vegetables on the day before the survey.

- ❑ 15% (21%) of pupils responded that they had at least 5 portions of fruit and vegetables to eat on the day before the survey.

Alcohol, Tobacco and Drugs

ALCOHOL

- ❑ 40% (27%) of pupils responded that they had an alcoholic drink in the 7 days before the survey.
- ❑ 15% (8%) of pupils responded that they drank alcohol on more than one day in the last 7 days; 8% (2%) said they drank on at least three days, while 4% (1%) said they drank alcohol, but did not specify on which days.
- ❑ 13% (7%) of pupils responded that they got drunk on at least one day in the last 7 days. 4% (2%) said they did so on more than one day, while 2% (1%) said they drank alcohol, but did not specify whether or not they got drunk.
- ❑ 0% (2%) of boys and 7% (2%) of girls drank over the advised weekly limit of alcohol for adult females of 14 units.
- ❑ 21% (28%) of pupils responded that they 'never' drink alcohol.
- ❑ 25% (35%) of pupils responded that they do drink alcohol and their parents/carers 'always' know, while 19% (20%) said their parents 'usually' know.
- ❑ Of the 38 (1295) pupils who drink alcohol, 32% (49%) said their parents/carers 'always' know.
- ❑ 35% (17%) of pupils responded that they drink alcohol and their parents/carers 'never' or only 'sometimes' know.
- ❑ Of the 38 (1295) pupils who drink alcohol, 45% (23%) said their parents/carers 'never' or only 'sometimes' know.
- ❑ 62% (71%) of pupils responded that their parents allow at least some drinking, while 15% (17%) said it isn't allowed and 23% (12%) have not discussed it with their parents/carers.
- ❑ 52% (48%) of pupils responded that they usually get their alcohol from their parents, while 48% (36%) said they usually get it from a friend or relative.
- ❑ 21% (9%) of pupils responded that there is a special drug and alcohol service for young people in their area, while 60% (74%) said they 'don't know' if there is.

SMOKING

- ❑ 15% (8%) of pupils responded that they smoked in the 7 days before the survey.
- ❑ 17% (16%) of pupils responded that they have used an e-cigarette.
- ❑ 50% (31%) of pupils responded that they have smoked in the past or smoke now.
- ❑ 6% (5%) of pupils responded that they smoke 'regularly'.
- ❑ Of the 3 (92) pupils who smoke regularly, 100% (57%) said they would like to give up.

- ❑ 40% (29%) of pupils responded that their parents/carers smoke.
- ❑ 15% (10%) of pupils responded that someone smokes indoors at home in rooms that they use.
- ❑ 17% (16%) of pupils responded that someone smokes in a car when they are in it too.
- ❑ 51% (65%) of pupils responded that no-one ever smokes at home.
- ❑ 36% (25%) of pupils responded that smoking happens only outside at home.
- ❑ 6% (6%) of pupils responded that smoking happens only in certain rooms at home.
- ❑ 6% (3%) of pupils responded that smokers can smoke anywhere at home.

DRUGS

- ❑ 71% (50%) of pupils responded that they are 'fairly sure' or 'certain' that they know someone personally who uses drugs listed in the questionnaire.
- ❑ 40% (29%) of pupils responded that they have been offered at least one of the drugs listed.
- ❑ 25% (14%) of pupils reported that they have taken at least one of the drugs listed in the questionnaire.
- ❑ 15% (7%) of pupils responded that they have taken at least one of the drugs listed during the last month.
- ❑ 19% (11%) of pupils responded that they have taken at least one of the drugs listed during the last year.
- ❑ 21% (11%) of pupils responded that they have got drugs from a friend.
- ❑ 13% (8%) of pupils responded that they have taken drugs and alcohol on the same occasion, while 0% (1%) said they 'don't know' if they have.
- ❑ 33% (39%) of pupils responded that they have found school lessons about drugs 'quite' or 'very' useful, while 23% (14%) have found them 'not at all' useful and 10% (11%) couldn't remember any.

Emotional Health and Well-being

WORRYING

- ❑ 92% (84%) of pupils responded that they worry about at least one of the issues listed 'quite a lot' or 'a lot'.
- ❑ 91% (67%) of pupils responded that they know someone personally who has self-harmed.

HAPPINESS

- ❑ 35% (16%) of pupils responded that they are 'not much' or 'not at all' happy with their life at the moment.
- ❑ 40% (64%) of pupils responded that they are at least 'quite' happy with their life at the moment.

SELF-ESTEEM

- ❑ 44% (21%) of pupils had a med-low self-esteem score (9 or less).
- ❑ 23% (43%) of pupils had a high self-esteem score (15 or more).

- ❑ 54% (71%) of pupils responded that they feel happy talking to other pupils at school.

Relationships and Sexual Health

- ❑ 42% (41%) of pupils responded that they don't want anyone to talk with them about puberty and growing up, while 31% (41%) said they would like their parents/carers to talk with them and 33% (28%) would like young people to do so.
- ❑ 21% (29%) of pupils responded that they have found school lessons about puberty and growing up 'quite' or 'very' useful, while 29% (15%) have found them 'not at all' useful and 15% (16%) couldn't remember any.
- ❑ 16% (24%) of pupils responded that school lessons are their main source of information about relationships and sexual health, while 27% (31%) said their friends are and 11% (16%) said their parents/carers are.
- ❑ 21% (31%) of pupils responded that they have found school lessons about sex education 'quite' or 'very' useful, while 25% (16%) have found them 'not at all' useful and 19% (15%) couldn't remember any.

SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED INFECTIONS

- ❑ 71% (60%) of pupils correctly identified that HIV/AIDS can be treated but not cured; 21% (13%) correctly identified that herpes can also be treated but not cured.
- ❑ 17% (21%) of pupils responded that they have found school lessons about HIV/AIDS 'quite' or 'very' useful, while 21% (14%) have found them 'not at all' useful and 35% (31%) couldn't remember any.
- ❑ 42% (43%) of pupils responded that they know where they can get condoms free of charge.
- ❑ 23% (15%) of pupils responded that there is a sexual health service for young people available in their area, while 68% (74%) said they 'don't know' if there is.

PEER PRESSURE

- ❑ 63% (69%) of pupils responded that they can 'usually or always' say no when a friend wants them to do something they don't want to do.
- ❑ 15% (6%) of pupils responded that they can 'rarely' or 'never' say no when a friend wants them to do something they don't want to do.
- ❑ 48% (25%) of pupils responded that they worry about relationships 'quite a lot' or 'a lot'.
- ❑ 52% (40%) of pupils responded that they 'agree' there is pressure on young people to have sex.

SEXUAL ORIENTATION – YEAR 10

- ❑ 8% (85%) of Year 10 pupils responded that they are straight/heterosexual.
- ❑ 38% (0%) of Year 10 pupils responded that they are gay/lesbian, while 71% (0%) said they are bisexual.

Health & Hygiene

DENTAL HEALTH

- ❑ 75% (84%) of pupils responded that they have visited the dentist in the past 6 months, while 94% (95%) said they have been in the last year.
- ❑ 6% (5%) of pupils responded that they last visited the dentist more than a year ago, while 0% (0%) said they have never been.

DOCTORS

- ❑ 60% (69%) of pupils responded that they have visited the doctor in the past 6 months, while 77% (86%) said they have been in the last year.
- ❑ 23% (14%) of pupils responded that they last visited the doctor more than a year ago.
- ❑ 38% (21%) of pupils responded that they felt 'quite' or 'very' uneasy on their last visit to the doctor.
- ❑ 31% (50%) of pupils responded that they felt 'at ease' on their last visit to the doctor.
- ❑ 56% (38%) of pupils responded that they worry about their physical health 'quite a lot' or 'a lot'.

Safety

ACTIVE TRAVEL

- ❑ 40% (38%) of pupils responded that they travelled to school by car/van on the day of the survey.
- ❑ 0% (2%) of pupils responded that they cycled to school on the day of the survey.
- ❑ 46% (44%) of pupils responded that they walked to school on the day of the survey.

ACCIDENTS

- ❑ 24% (30%) of pupils responded that they have had at least one accident which was treated at a health centre or hospital in the last 12 months; 11% (12%) said they have had more than one accident which needed treatment.

BULLYING

- ❑ 60% (39%) of pupils responded that they have been bullied at school.
- ❑ 27% (13%) of pupils responded that they have been bullied when they are not in school (including their journey to school).
- ❑ 29% (13%) of pupils responded that their school deals with bullying 'badly', while 6% (6%) said bullying is not a problem in their school.
- ❑ 21% (36%) of pupils responded that their school deals with bullying 'quite' or 'very' well.
- ❑ 46% (63%) of pupils responded that they think their school takes bullying seriously, while 19% (12%) think it doesn't take it seriously.
- ❑ 29% (12%) of boys and 50% (25%) of girls responded that they feel afraid of going to school because of bullying at least 'sometimes'.

- ❑ 17% (5%) of pupils responded that they 'often' or 'very often' feel afraid of going to school because of bullying.
- ❑ 63% (40%) of pupils responded that they have been teased/made fun of in the last month and 21% (16%) said they have been pushed/hit for no reason.
- ❑ 33% (21%) of pupils responded that they have experienced negative behaviour outside at school during breaktimes in the last month, while 35% (20%) said they have experienced such behaviour in a classroom during breaktimes and 35% (18%) have experienced it during lesson time.
- ❑ 56% (31%) of pupils responded that they think they are being picked on or bullied because of the way they look and 42% (21%) said they think they are being picked on or bullied because of their size or weight.

STRANGERS

- ❑ 44% (23%) of pupils responded that they have been approached by an adult who scared or upset them, while 13% (10%) said they are 'not sure' if they have been.
- ❑ 28% (10%) of pupils responded that they knew the person who scared or upset them.
- ❑ Of the 21 (389) pupils who have been approached by an adult who scared or upset them, 50% (36%) said they knew the person.

FEELING SAFE

- ❑ 81% (81%) of pupils rated their safety at school as 'good' or 'very good', while 44% (49%) said the same of going out after dark.
- ❑ 25% (16%) of pupils rated their safety when going out after dark as 'poor' or 'very poor'.

VIOLENCE AND AGGRESSION

- ❑ 9% (5%) of pupils responded that they have been the victim of violence or aggression in the area where they live in the last 12 months, while 2% (6%) said they are 'not sure' if they have been.
- ❑ 8% (7%) of pupils responded that they have been involved in a violent incident where a weapon was used/threatened, while 8% (5%) said they are 'not sure' if they have been.
- ❑ 13% (8%) of pupils responded that they at least 'sometimes' carry weapons or something else for protection when going out.
- ❑ 17% (11%) of pupils responded that they know someone else who carries weapons or something else for protection when going out, while 21% (16%) said they are 'not sure' if they do.
- ❑ 35% (20%) of pupils responded that there has been shouting and arguing between adults at home at least 'once or twice' in the last month that frightened them, while 8% (3%) said it happened 'every day/almost every day'.
- ❑ 8% (4%) of pupils responded that there has been violence between adults at home at least 'once or

twice' in the last month, while 4% (1%) said it happened 'every day/almost every day'.

INTERNET SAFETY

- ❑ 83% (69%) of pupils responded that they have a computer with internet access in their bedroom and 15% (29%) said their parents/carers have rules about what internet sites they can use.
- ❑ 88% (76%) of pupils responded that they have been told how to stay safe while online and 44% (17%) said they have met someone in real life whom they first met online.

School and Career

SCHOOL LESSONS

- ❑ 33% (44%) of pupils responded that they enjoy 'most' or 'all' of their lessons at school.
- ❑ 21% (15%) of pupils responded that they enjoy 'hardly any' of their lessons at school.
- ❑ 65% (43%) of pupils responded that they worry about school-work problems 'quite a lot' or 'a lot', while 79% (64%) said they worry about exams and tests.
- ❑ 23% (23%) of pupils responded that they have found school lessons about citizenship 'quite' or 'very' useful; 23% (27%) said the same regarding lessons about personal, social and health education.
- ❑ 21% (19%) of pupils responded that they have found school lessons about citizenship 'not at all' useful.

ATTENDANCE

- ❑ 90% (91%) of pupils responded that they think it is important to go to school regularly, while 4% (3%) think it isn't important.
- ❑ 73% (68%) of pupils responded that they have been away from school in the last month due to illness or injury.
- ❑ 8% (11%) of pupils responded that they have not been absent from school in the last 12 months, while 83% (86%) of pupils responded that they have been absent and their parents/carers always know.
- ❑ 8% (3%) of pupils responded that they have been absent in the last 12 months and their parents/carers 'never' or only 'sometimes' know.

IEWS AND OPINIONS

- ❑ 15% (27%) of pupils said that they feel their views and opinions are listened to in their school, while 44% (32%) feel they are not listened to.
- ❑ 58% (62%) of pupils responded that their work is marked so they can see how to improve it and 35% (45%) said that the school prepares them for when they leave this school.

FUTURE PLANS

- ❑ 60% (63%) of pupils responded that they want to continue in full-time education at the end of Year 11.
- ❑ 29% (30%) of pupils responded that they want to find a job as soon as they can at the end of Year 11.

- ❑ 23% (32%) of pupils responded that they want to get training for a skilled job at the end of Year 11.
- ❑ 33% (37%) of pupils responded that they have found school lessons about careers education 'quite' or 'very' useful, while 29% (14%) have found them 'not at all' useful and 21% (15%) couldn't remember any.

Physical Activity

EXERCISE

- ❑ 19% (7%) of pupils responded that they don't enjoy physical activities 'at all'.
- ❑ 53% (73%) of pupils responded that they enjoy physical activities 'quite a lot' or 'a lot'.
- ❑ 19% (10%) of pupils responded that they don't find it 'at all' easy to be as physically active as they like.
- ❑ 49% (67%) of pupils responded that they find it at least 'quite' easy to be as physically active as they like.
- ❑ 44% (53%) of pupils responded that they have found school lessons about physical education (PE) 'quite' or 'very' useful, while 17% (10%) have found them

'not at all' useful and 10% (9%) couldn't remember any.

- ❑ 8% (3%) of pupils responded that they 'never or hardly ever' do any of the activities listed in their own time.
- ❑ 83% (80%) of pupils responded that they do one or more of the activities listed in their own time at least 'weekly'.
- ❑ 21% (30%) of pupils responded that they play football (soccer) in their own time at least 'weekly', while 27% (30%) said they go jogging.

Leisure

LEISURE TIME

- ❑ 68% (83%) of pupils responded that they spent time watching live or recorded TV programmes after school on the day before the survey, while 70% (73%) spent time doing homework and 49% (50%) played computer games.
- ❑ 54% (47%) of pupils responded that they used a computer for school work after school on the day before the survey, while 25% (35%) said they did some sport.

Significant Differences

Where differences can be seen between your school and the reference sample, you may find the enclosed table of some use in deciding if the differences seen are significant. The 'standard error' of a proportion is an assessment of how reliable our figures are, that is, the margin of error.

Two points in particular should be made:

1. when the sample size is small, it may be that just one individual voting a different way would make a large percentage difference to the results (so, one in twenty is 5%)
2. even if your sample is small, you may have a very high proportion of your available population – if, say, you sample every single pupil of your year 8 class. In this case, the notion of 'margin of error' doesn't really apply to the sampling, only to the process of collecting the responses.

So, if you have a sample of 50 students and 30% of them think that the school needs a new swimming pool, we can see from the table that standard error of the percentage is about $\pm 6.5\%$.

Pupil Comparisons

We have identified a few questions to consider in more detail to see how answers vary for different groups of students. We know that we get different answers depending on the age and experience of pupils and we also know that boys and girls often give different answers, for example to the physical activity questions, with boys in general being more active than the girls.

For each example, the question we are looking at is listed at the top of the table and beneath that, the question responses we are identifying are shown with the sample sizes involved.

The sample size for each table is shown in bold at the top of each column (overall Non-LGB data in brackets).

In the example above, 247 pupils in this school live with both parents together and 155 pupils don't.

When we look at the question which asks if they have free school meals, 9% of the whole school sample said they were compared with (10%) in the wider county sample. Breaking this down further by who they live with, 7% of pupils in this school who live with both parents had free school meals compared with 12% of pupils who don't live with both parents together.

Considerations

When interpreting the differences between the groups we have listed it is important to consider what else might have had an impact on the results. For example, girls generally record lower levels of high self-esteem so the observed differences may have more to do with gender differences than low/high self-esteem differences.

- ❑ 17% (10%) of pupils responded that they 'often' or 'very often' feel afraid of going to school because of bullying.
- ❑ 63% (57%) of pupils responded that they have been teased/made fun of in the last month and 21% (33%) said they have been pushed/hit for no reason.
- ❑ 33% (22%) of pupils responded that they have experienced negative behaviour outside at school during breaktimes in the last month, while 35% (34%) said they have experienced such behaviour in a classroom during breaktimes and 35% (43%) have experienced it during lesson time.
- ❑ 56% (41%) of pupils responded that they think they are being picked on or bullied because of the way they look and 42% (26%) said they think they are being picked on or bullied because of their size or weight.

STRANGERS

- ❑ 44% (41%) of pupils responded that they have been approached by an adult who scared or upset them, while 13% (9%) said they are 'not sure' if they have been.
- ❑ 28% (25%) of pupils responded that they knew the person who scared or upset them.

INTERNET SAFETY

- ❑ 83% (74%) of pupils responded that they have a computer with internet access in their bedroom and 15% (38%) said their parents/carers have rules about what internet sites they can use.
- ❑ 88% (86%) of pupils responded that they have been told how to stay safe while online and 44% (24%) said they have met someone in real life whom they first met online.

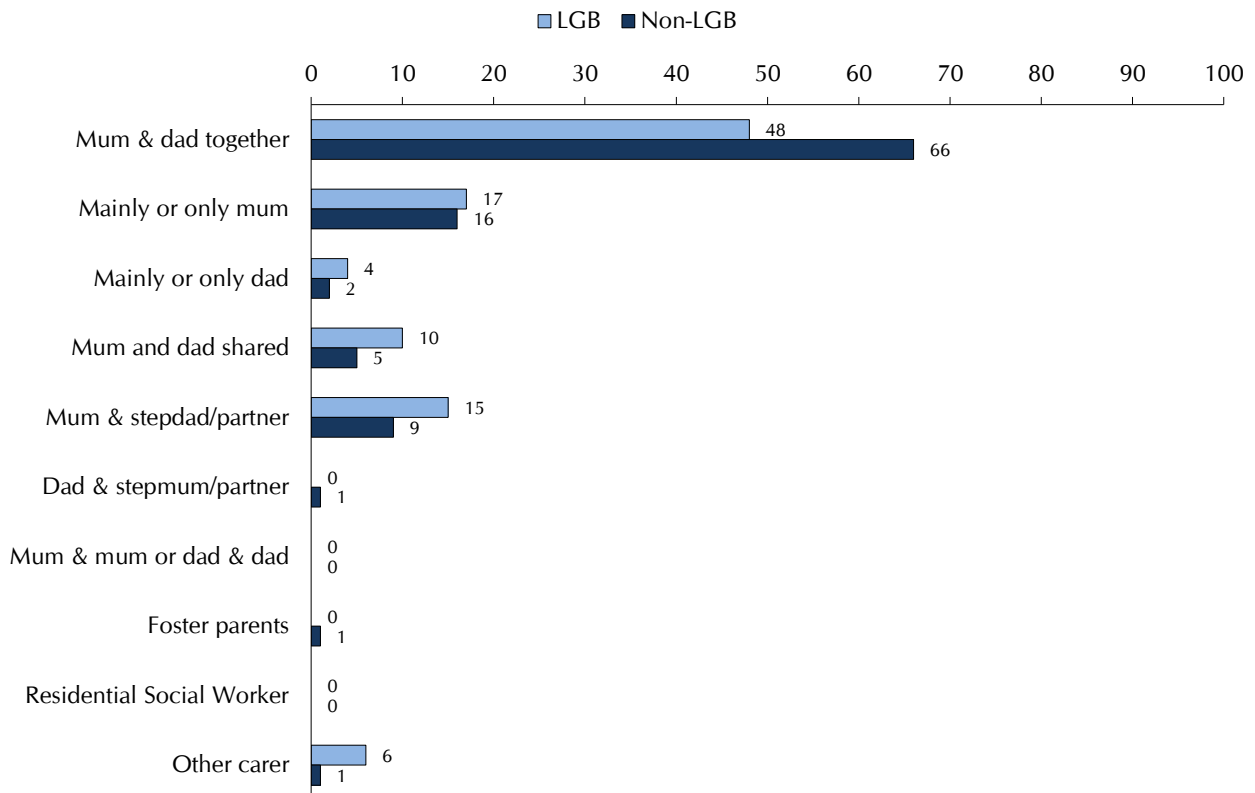

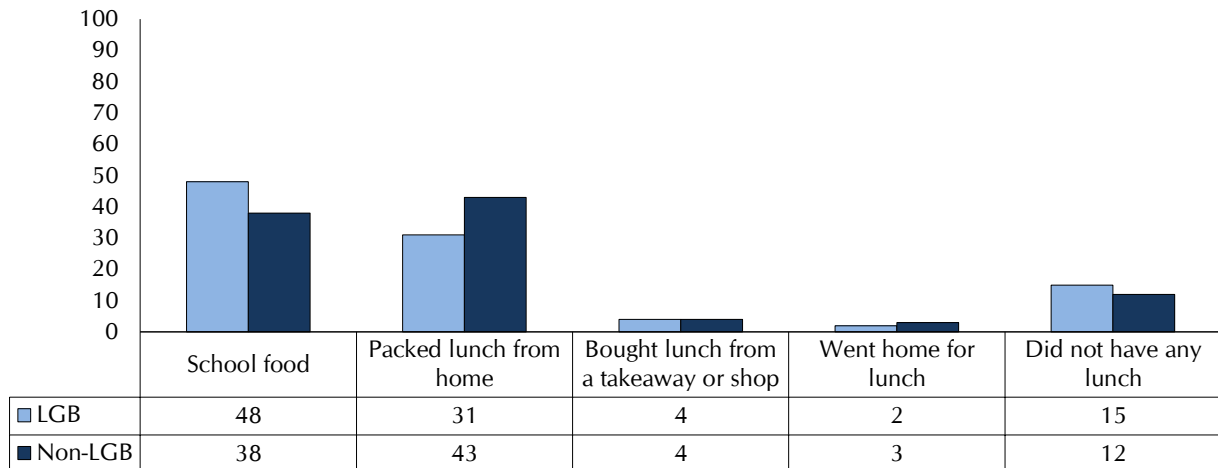

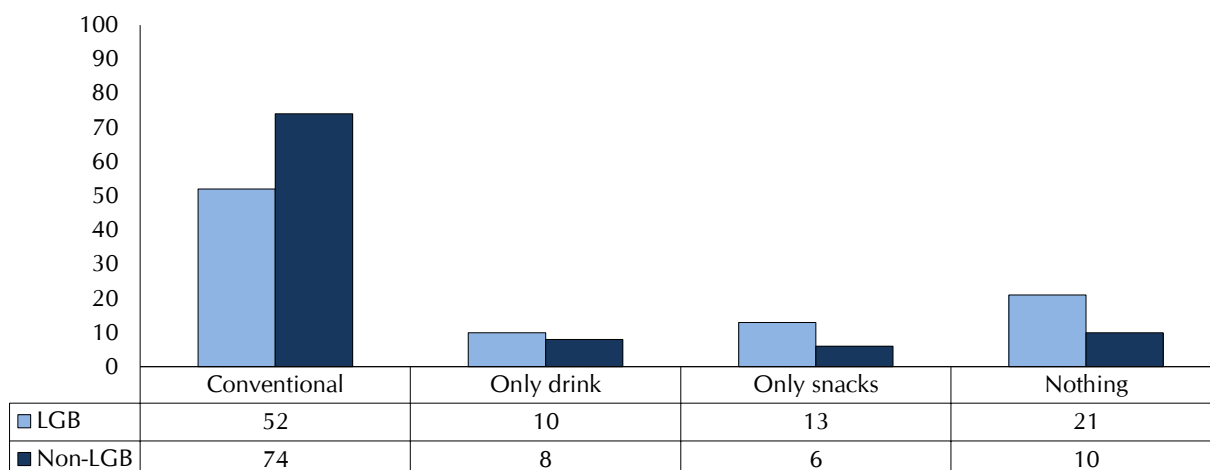

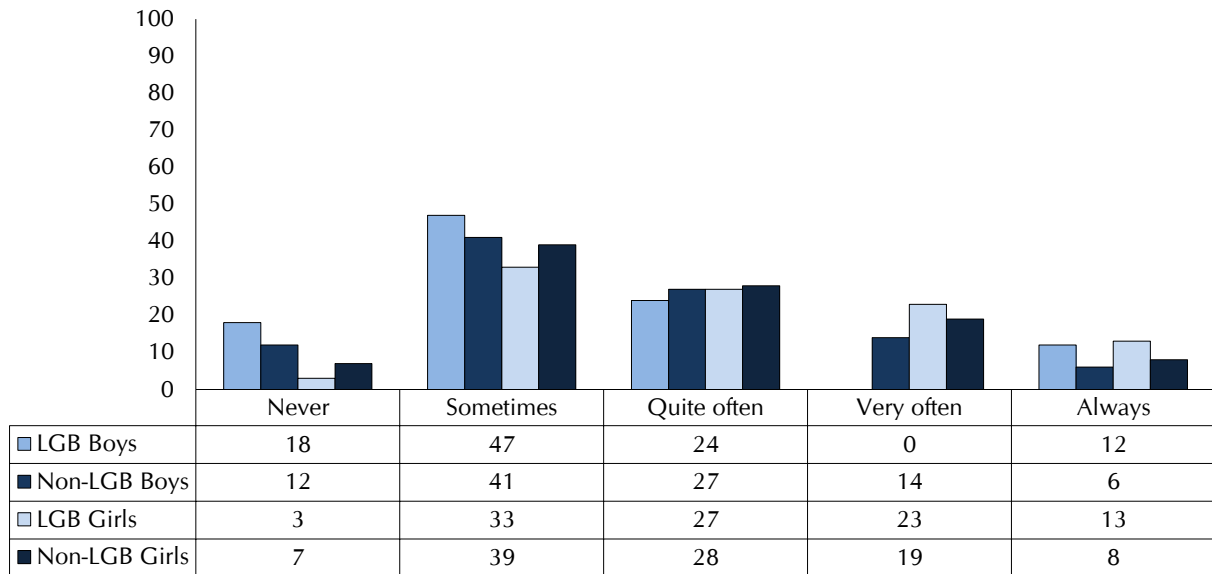

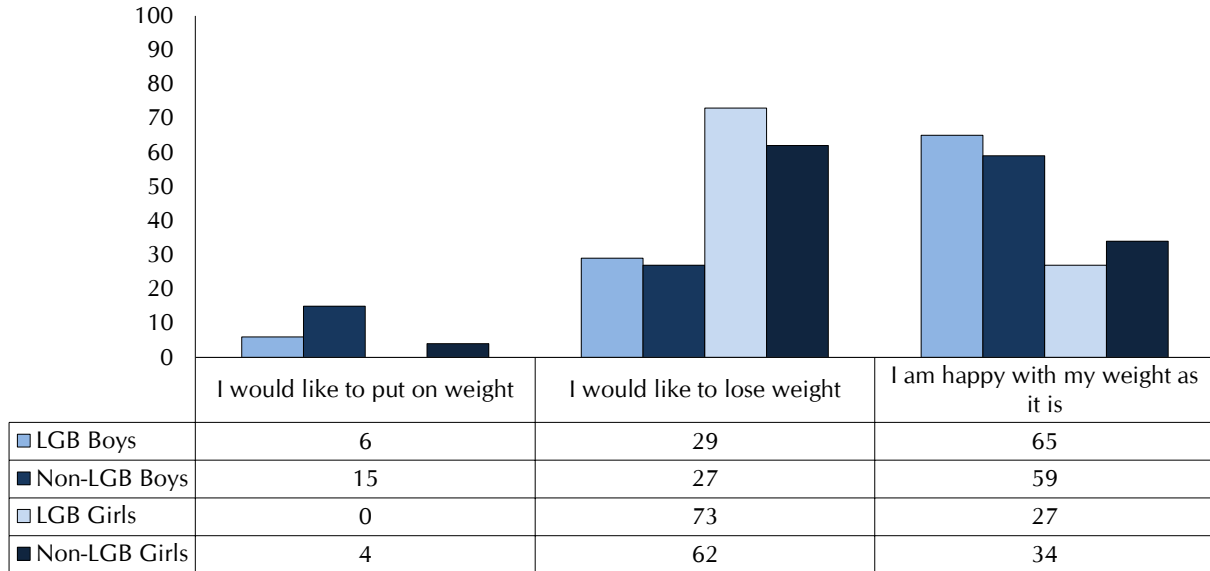

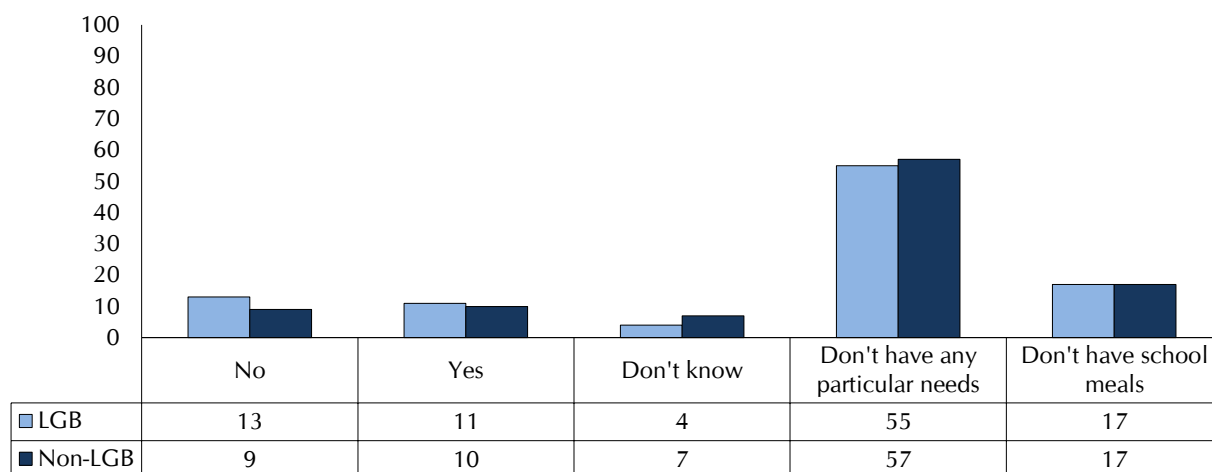

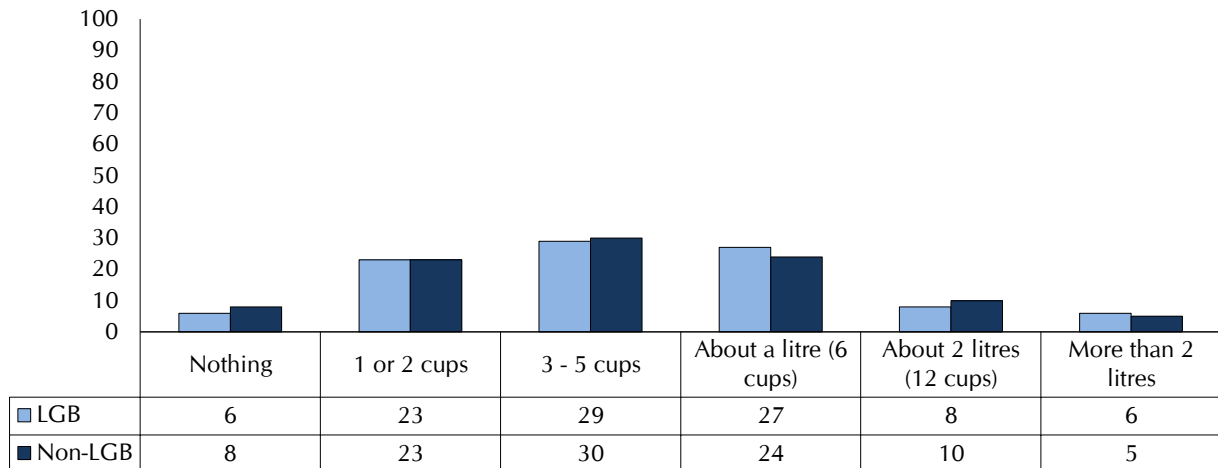

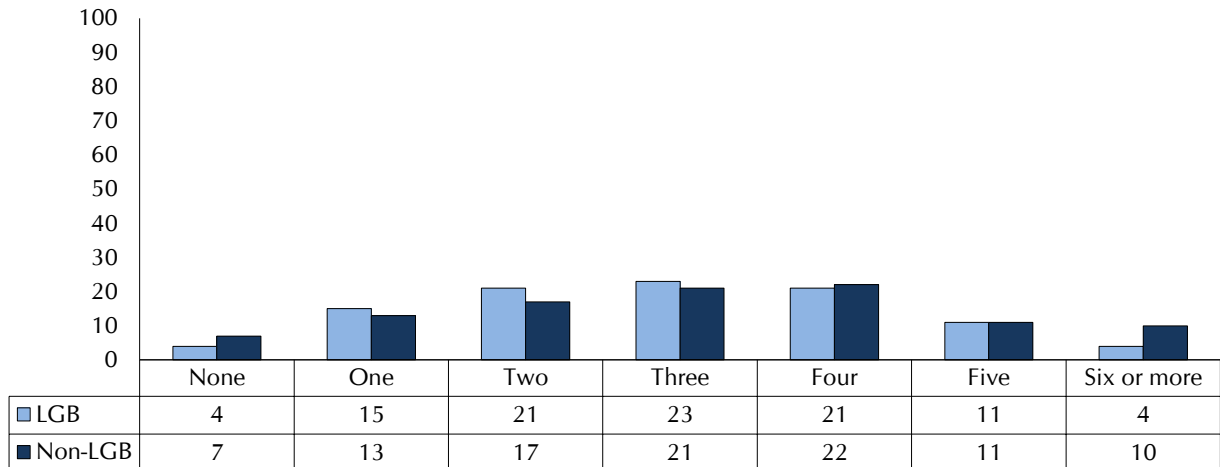

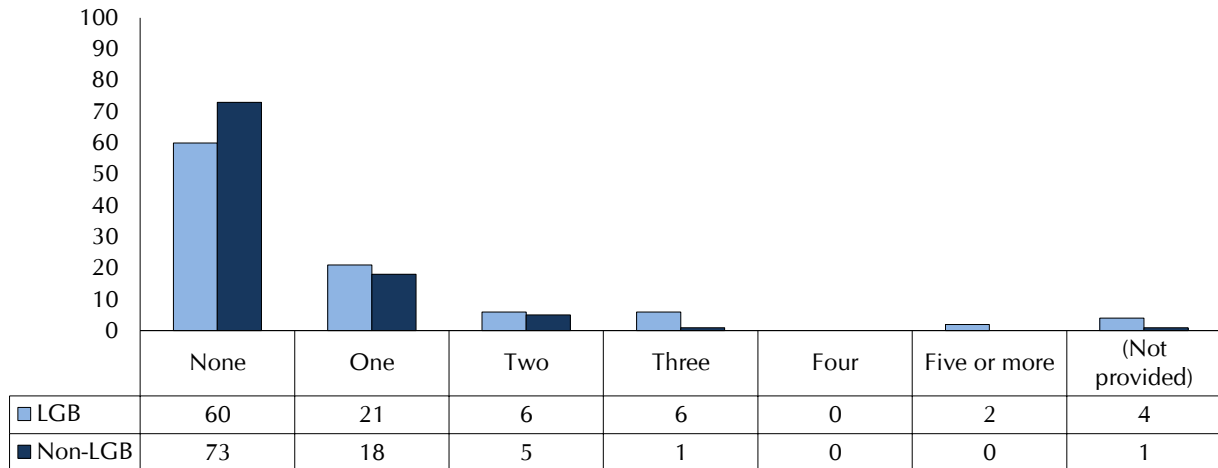

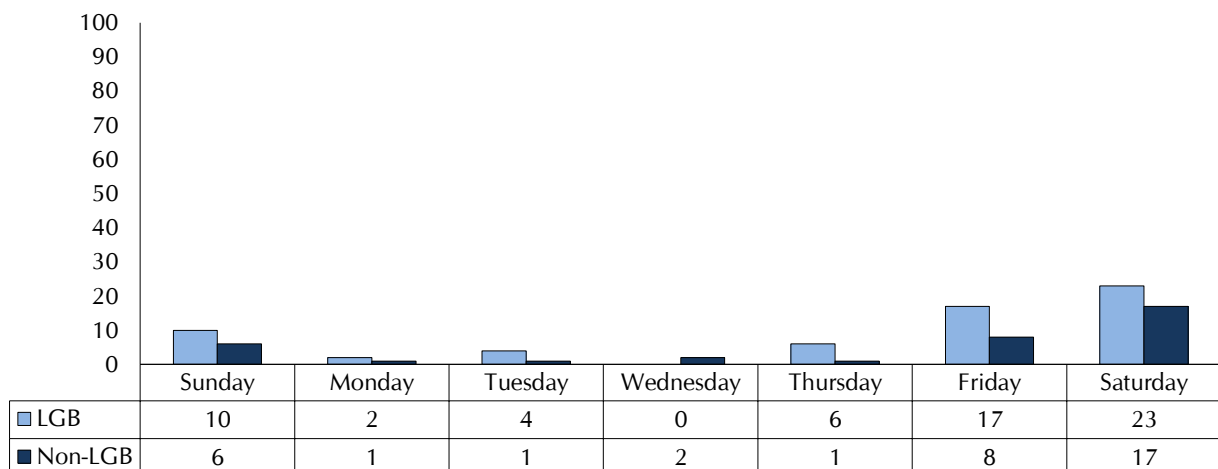

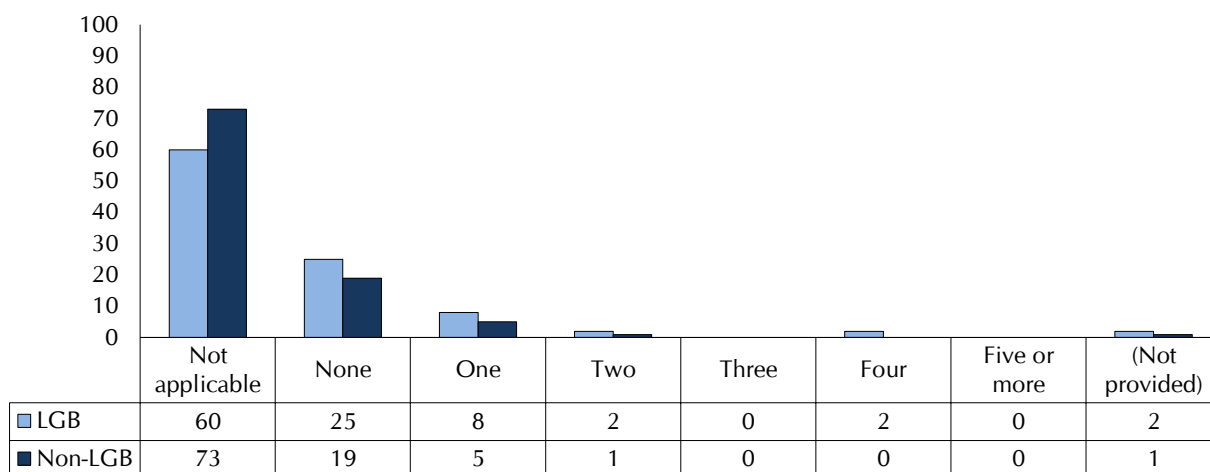

Q21. On how many days did you get drunk, in the last 7 days?

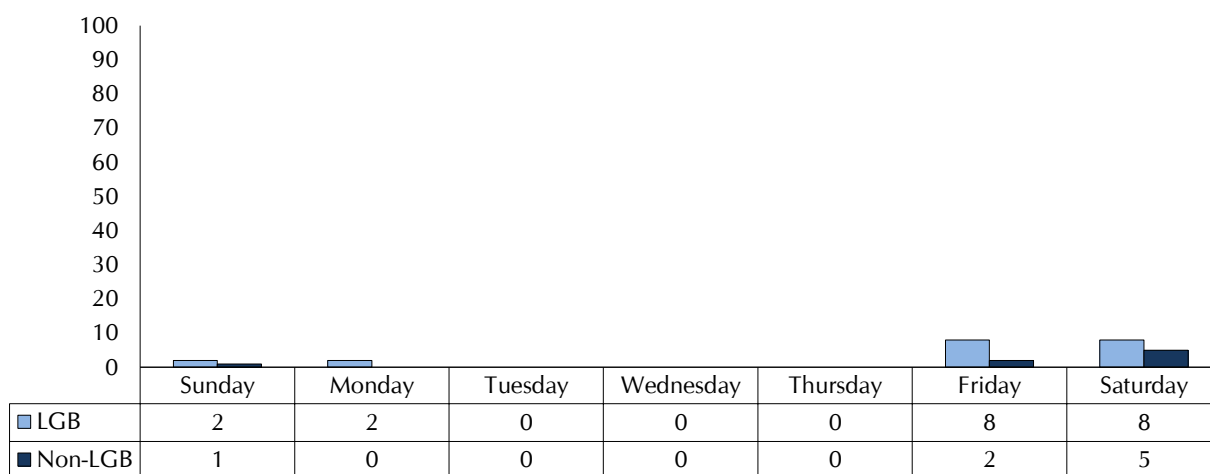

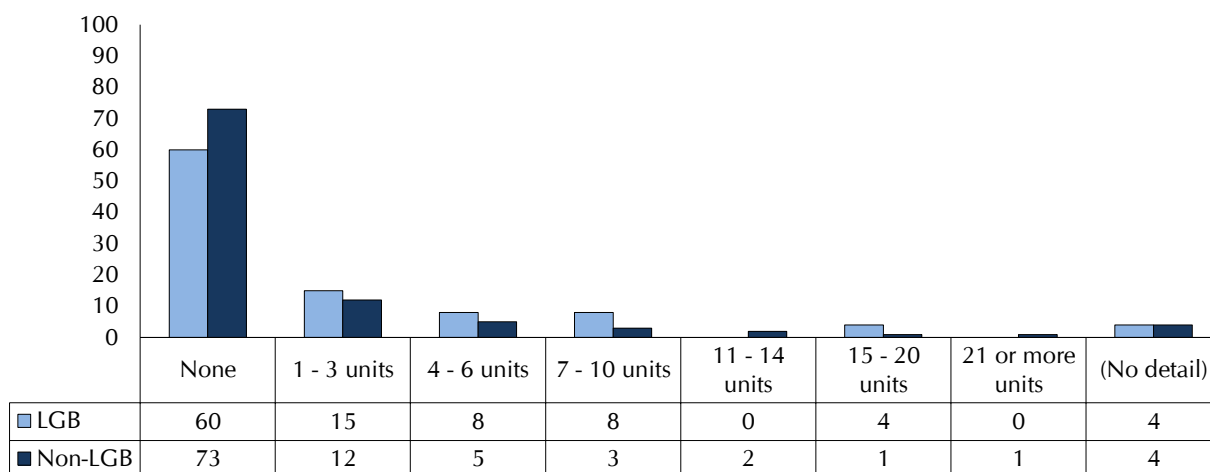

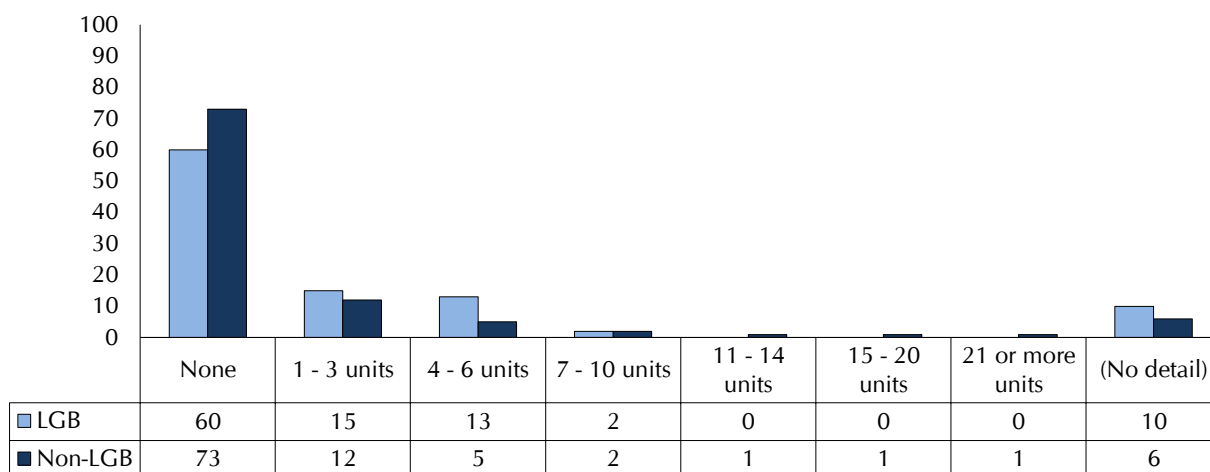

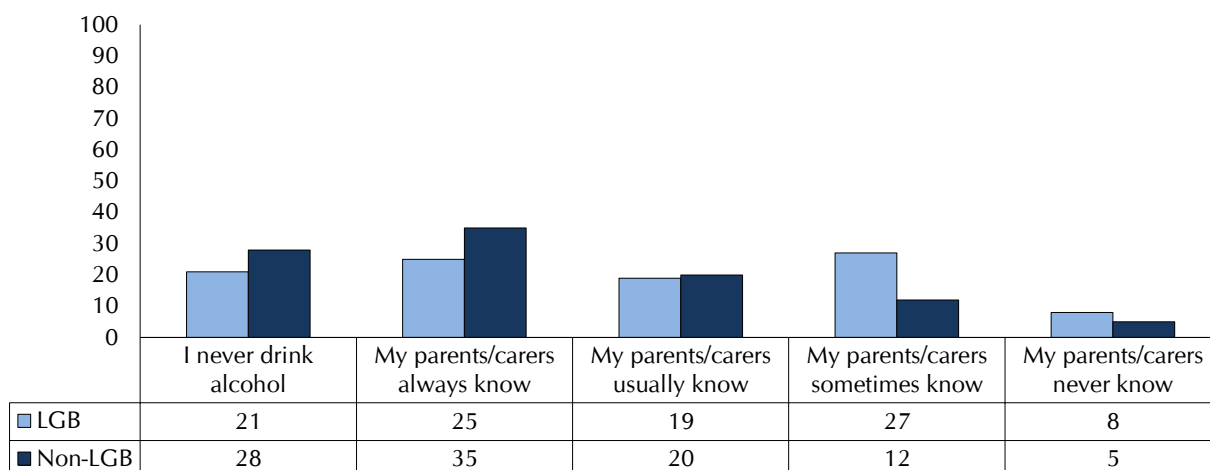

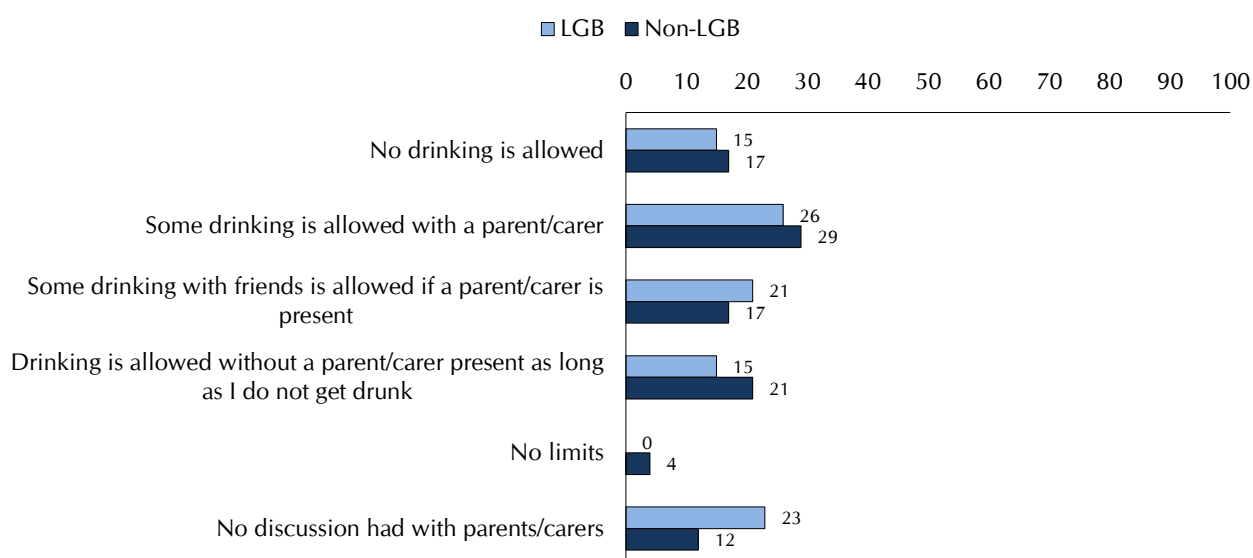

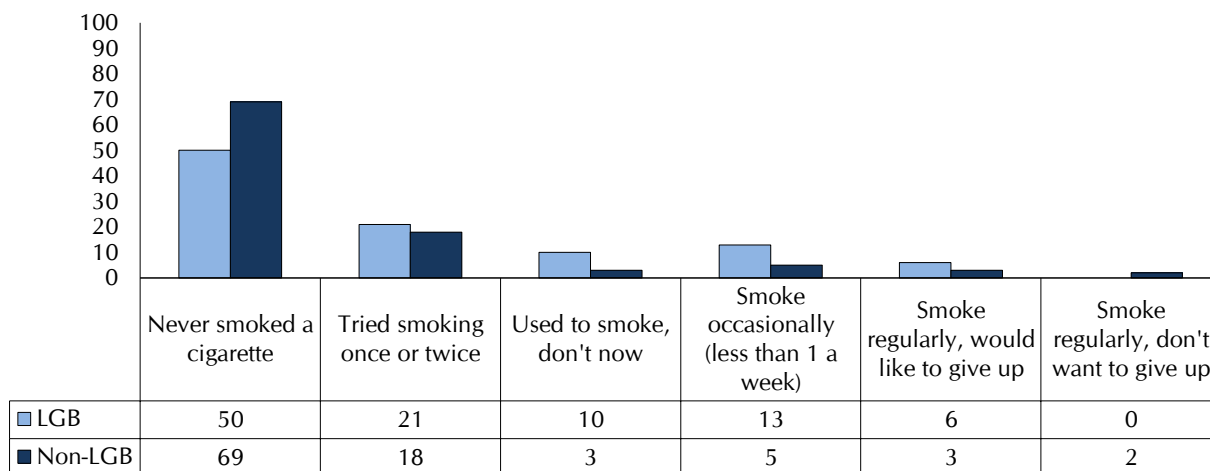

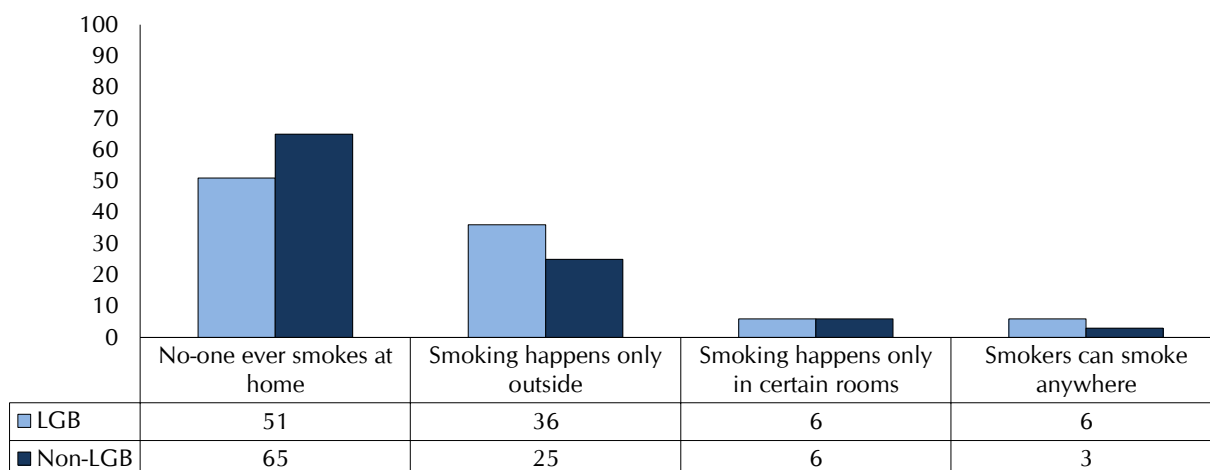

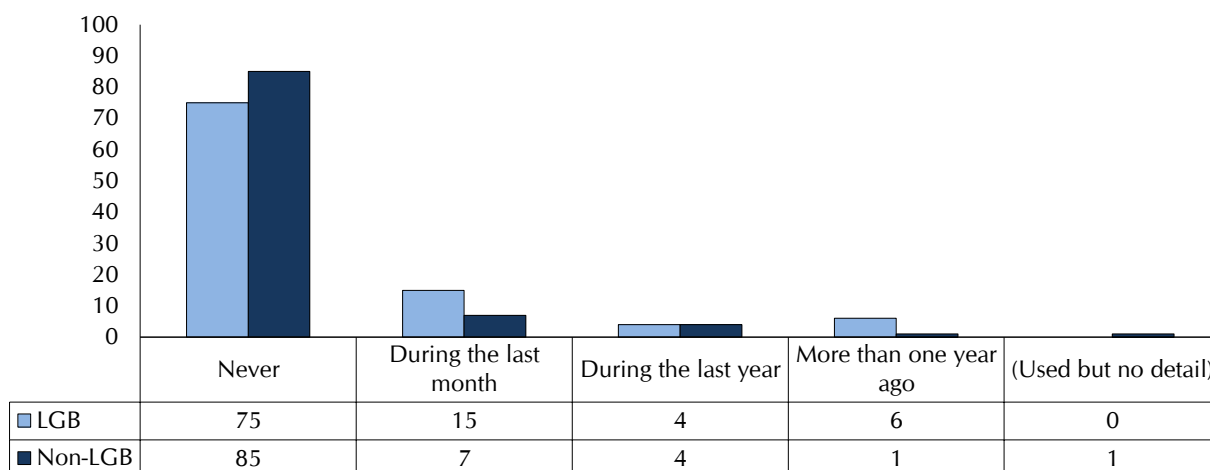

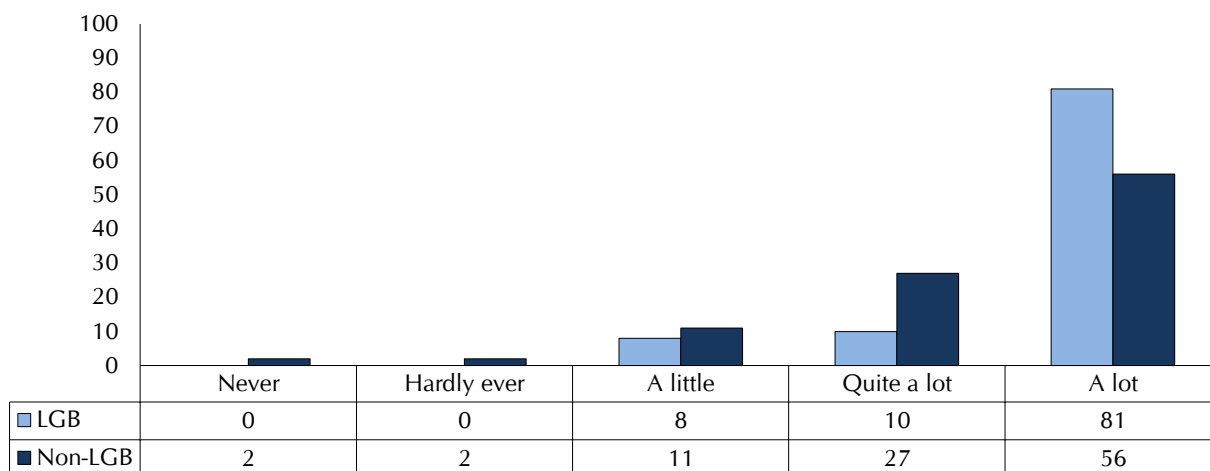

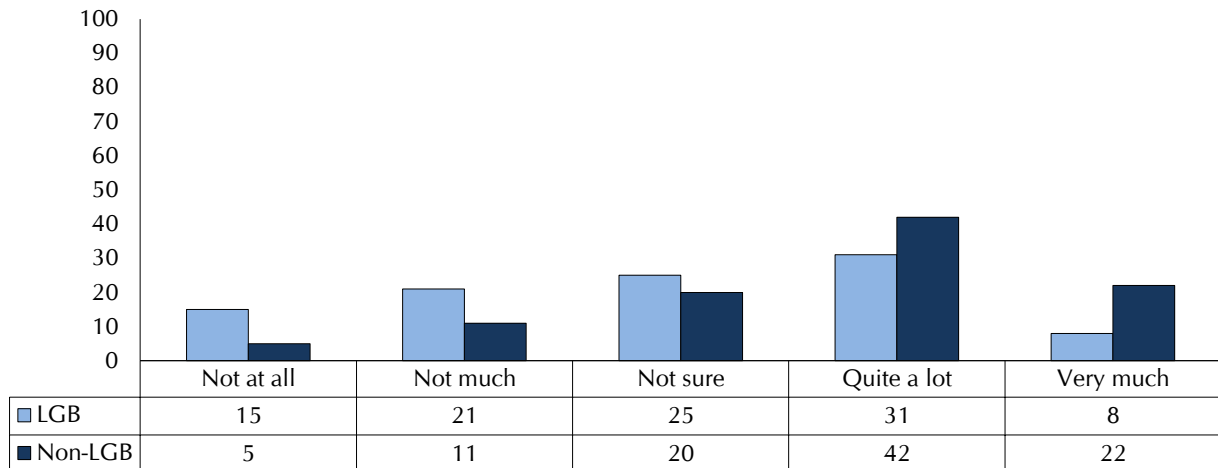

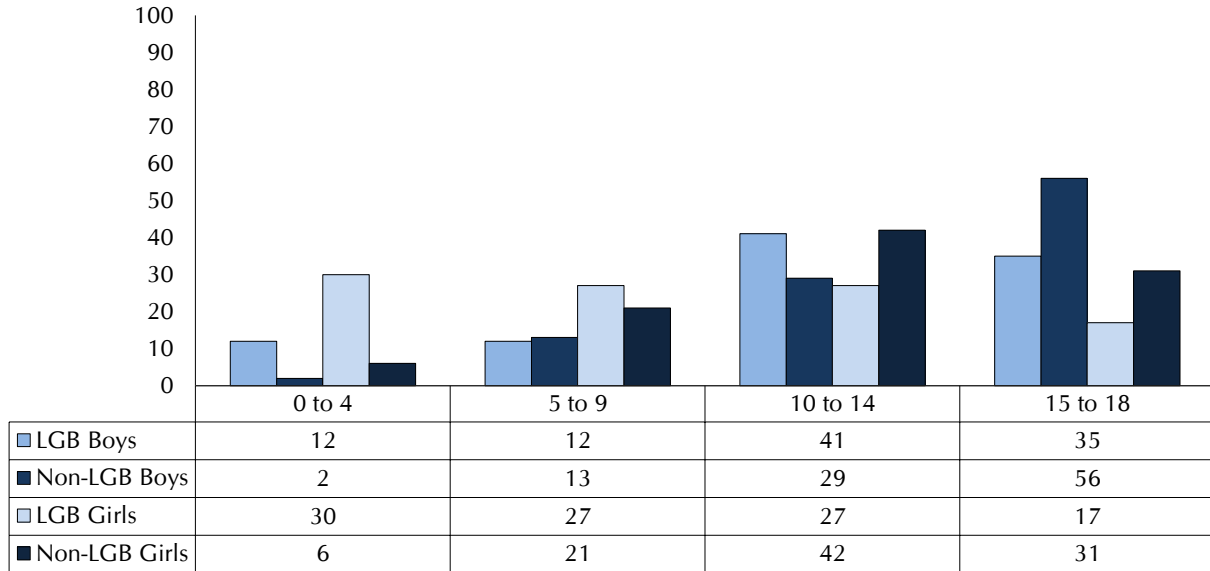

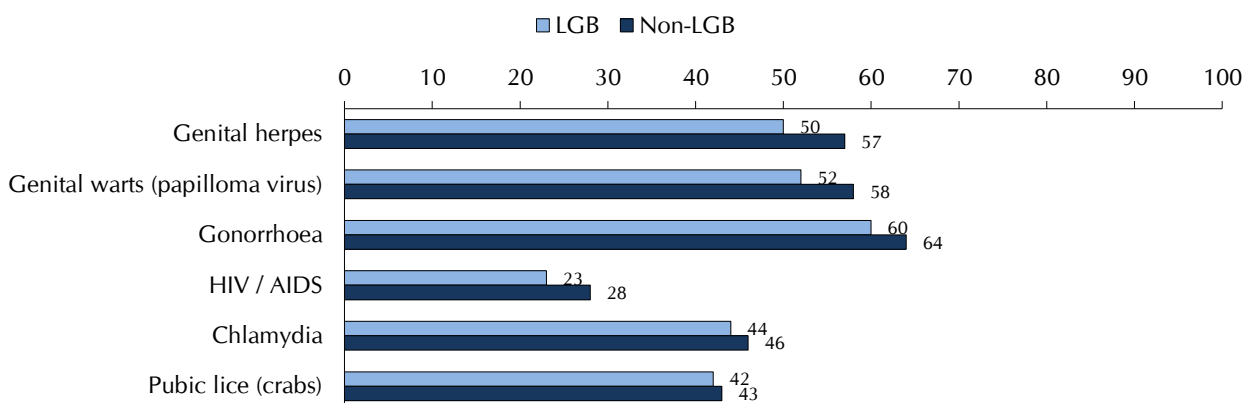

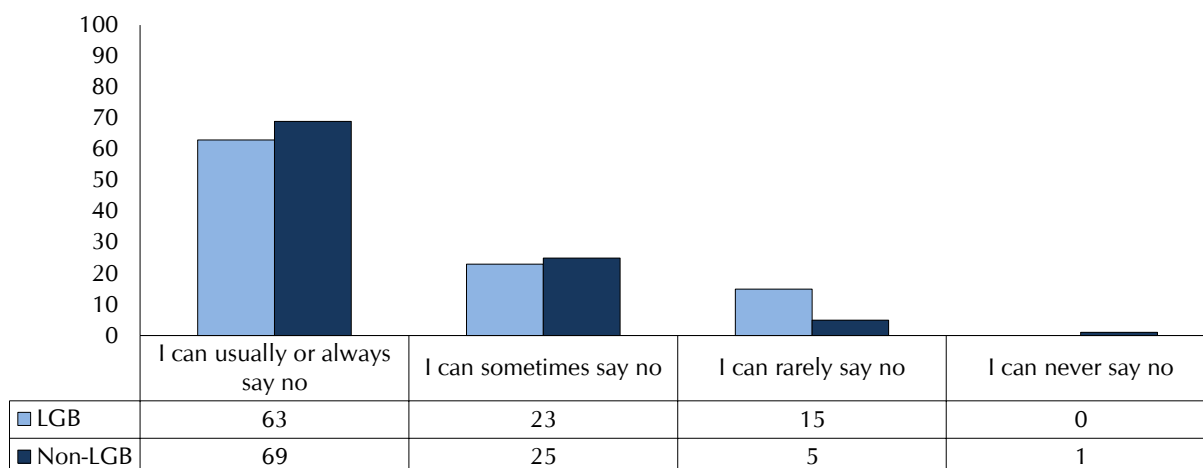

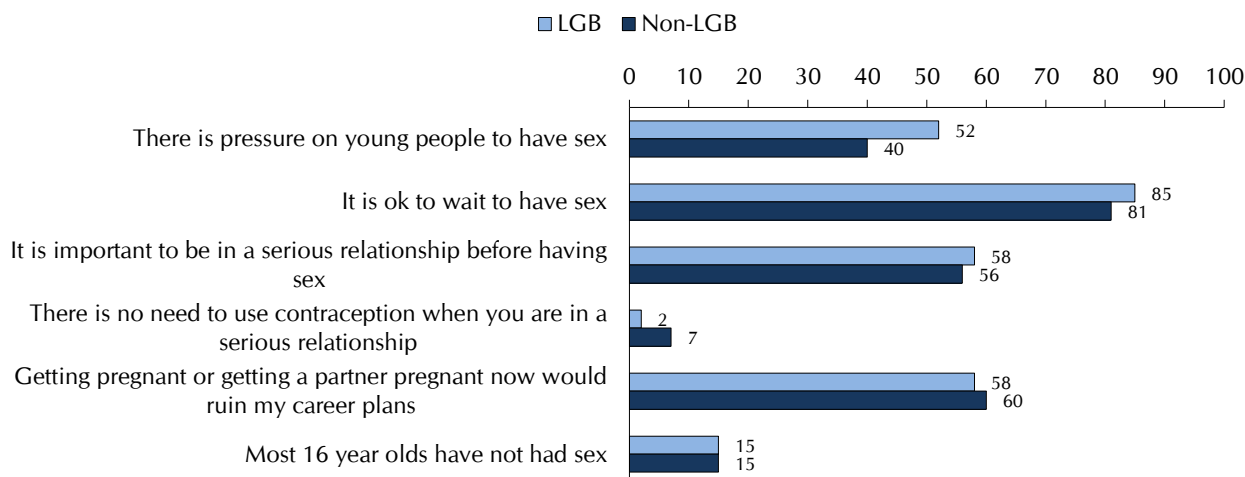

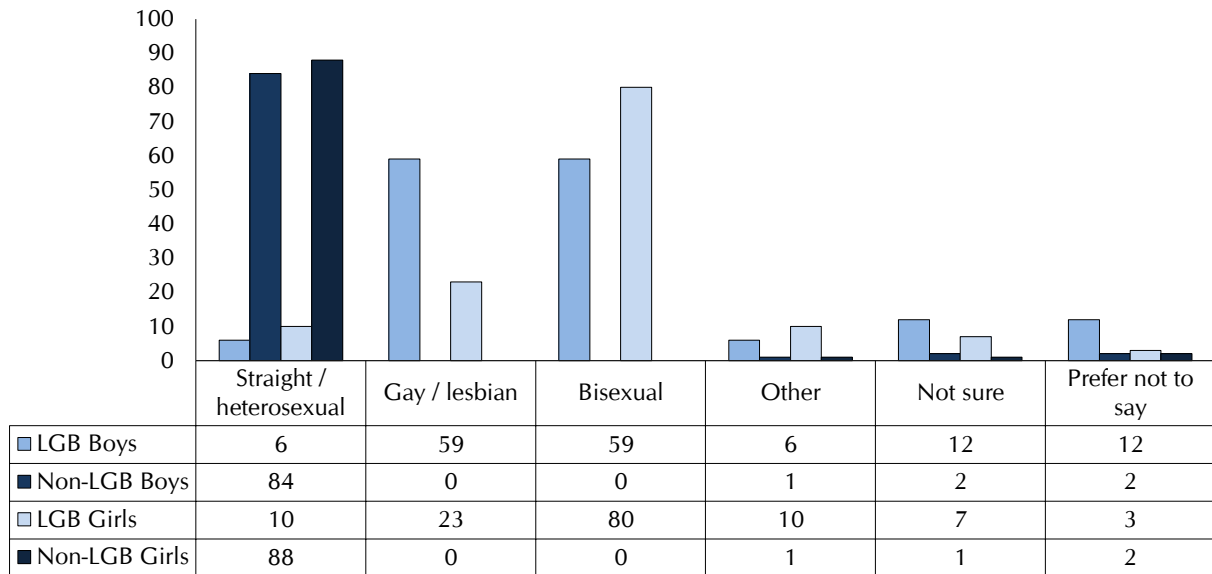

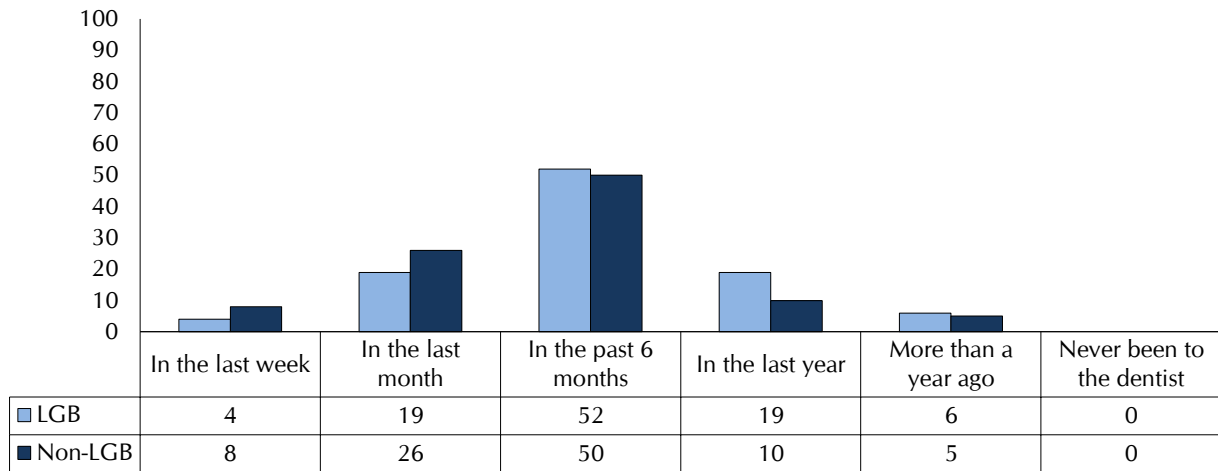

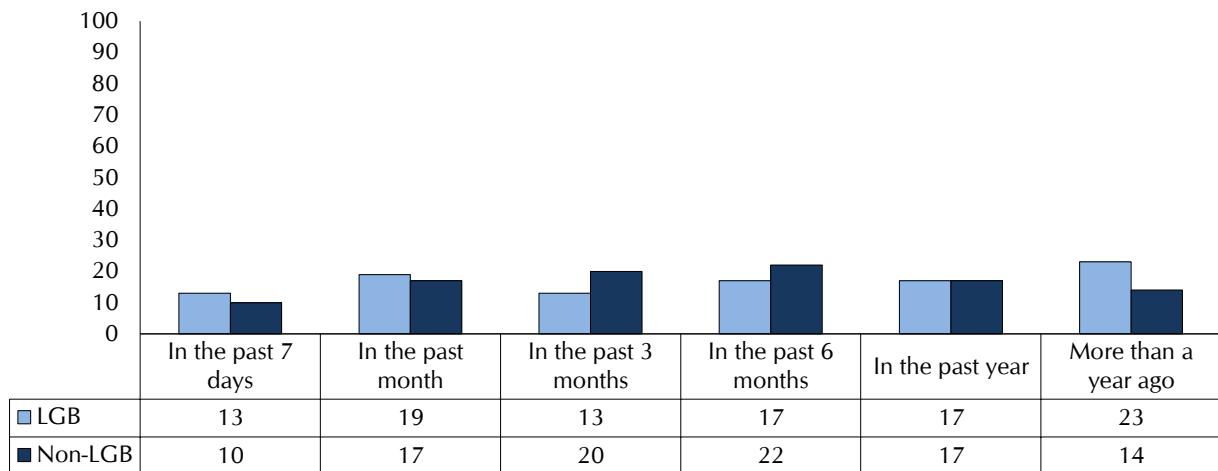

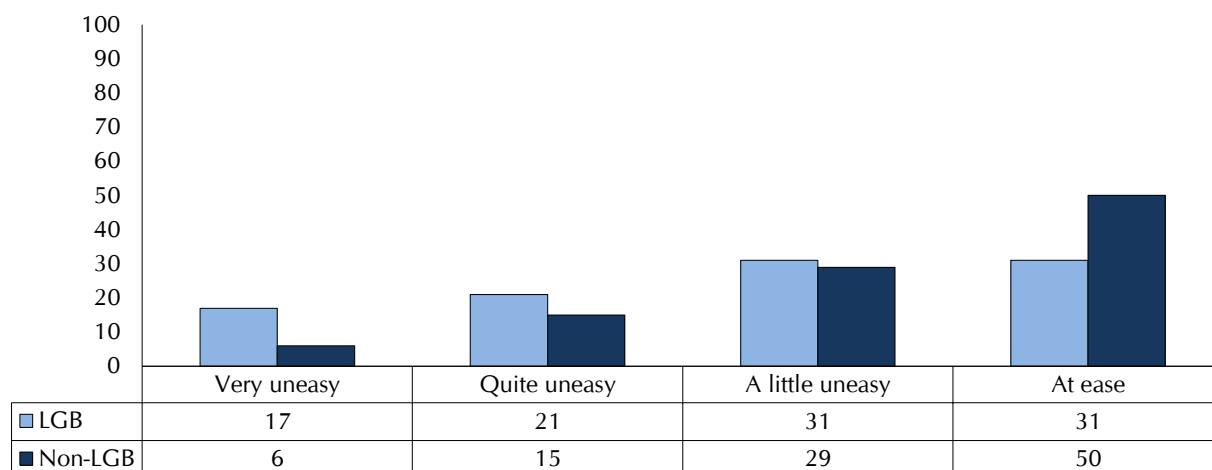

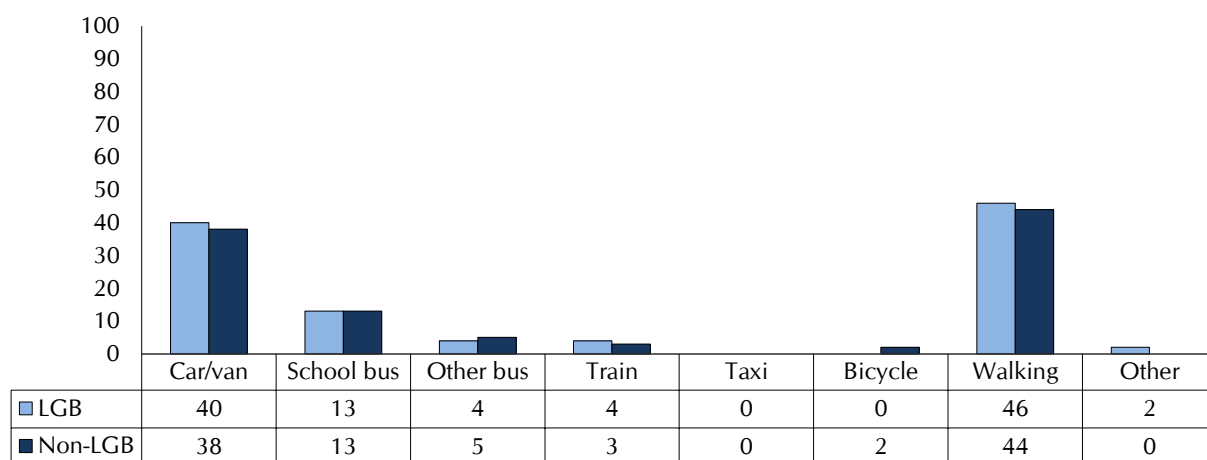

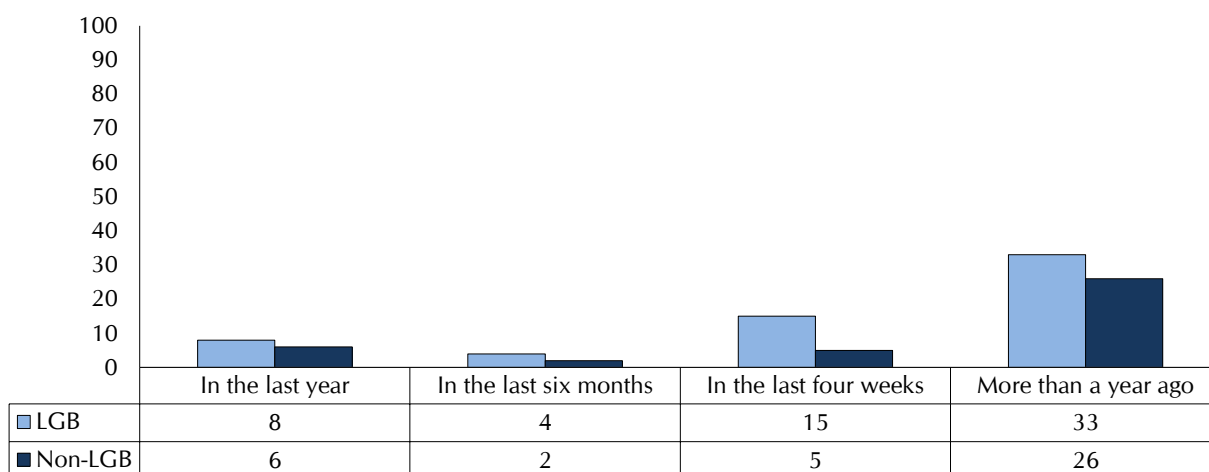

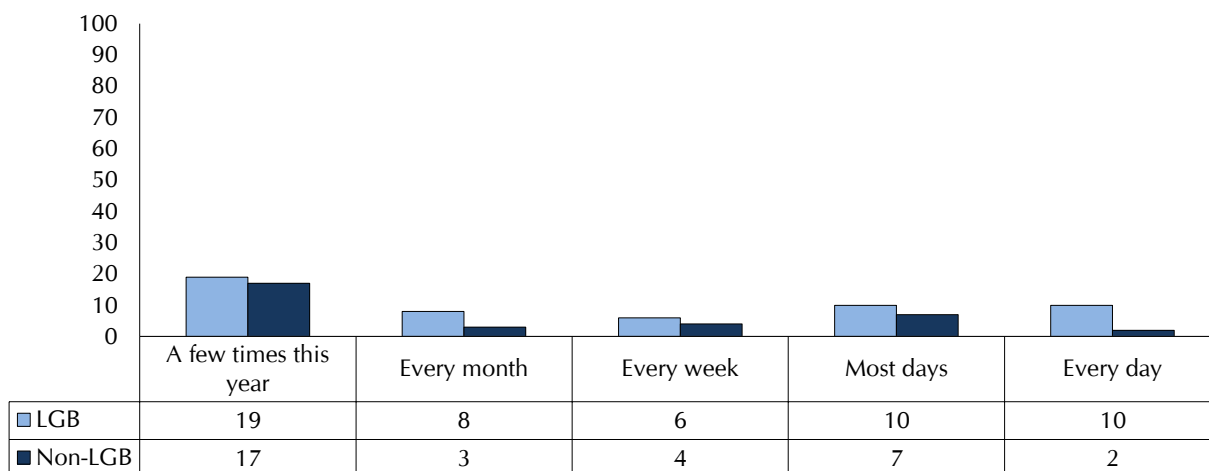

Q60. How often has someone done something to bully you at school?

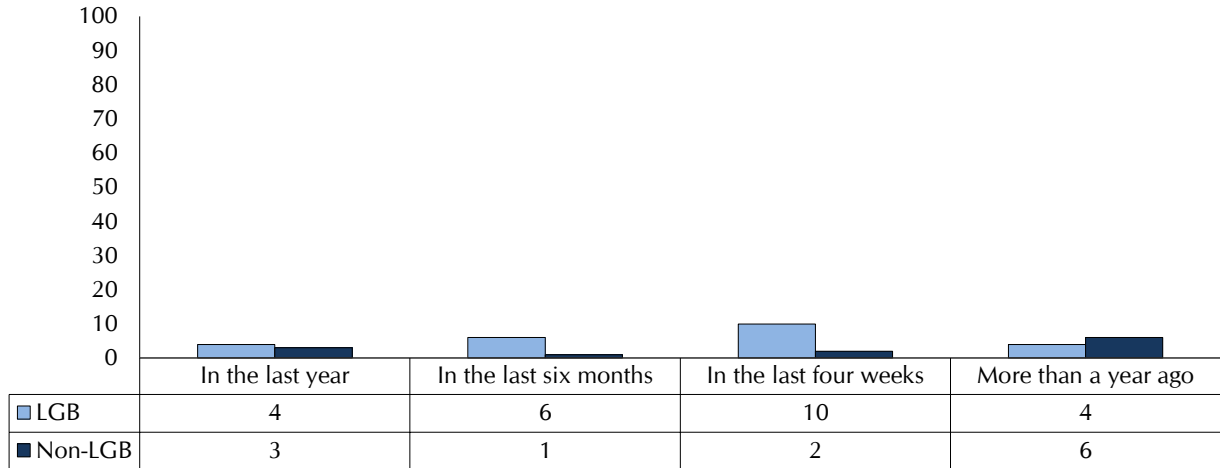

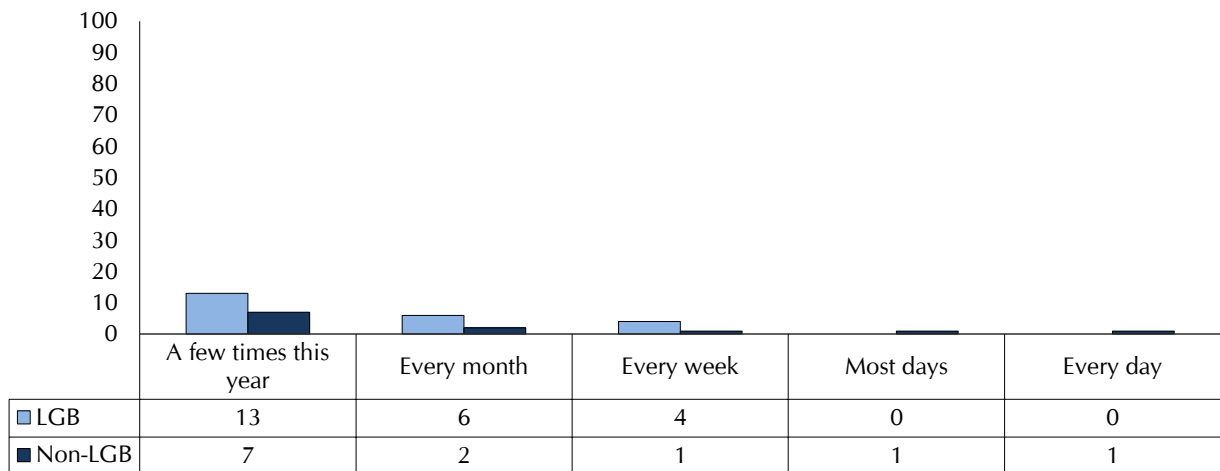

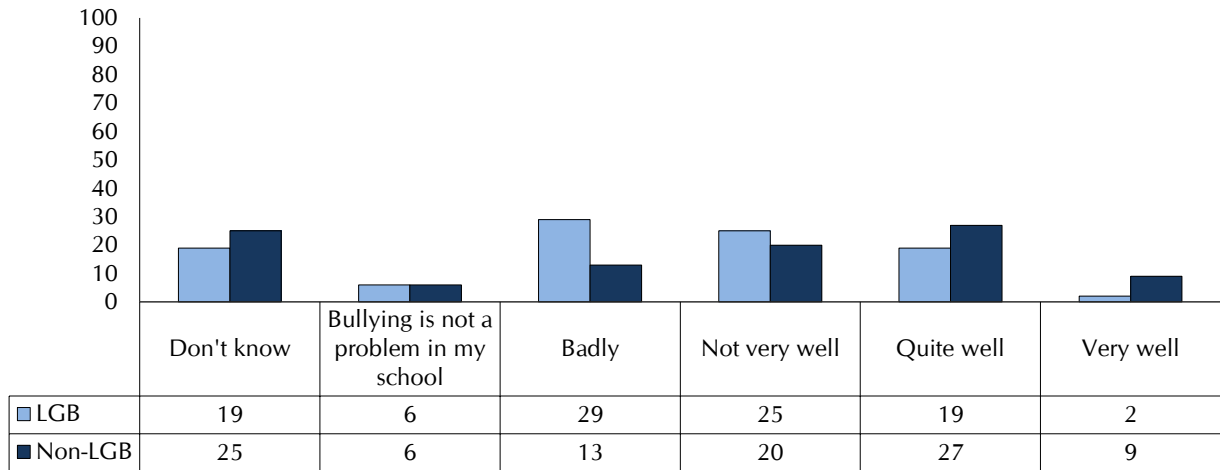

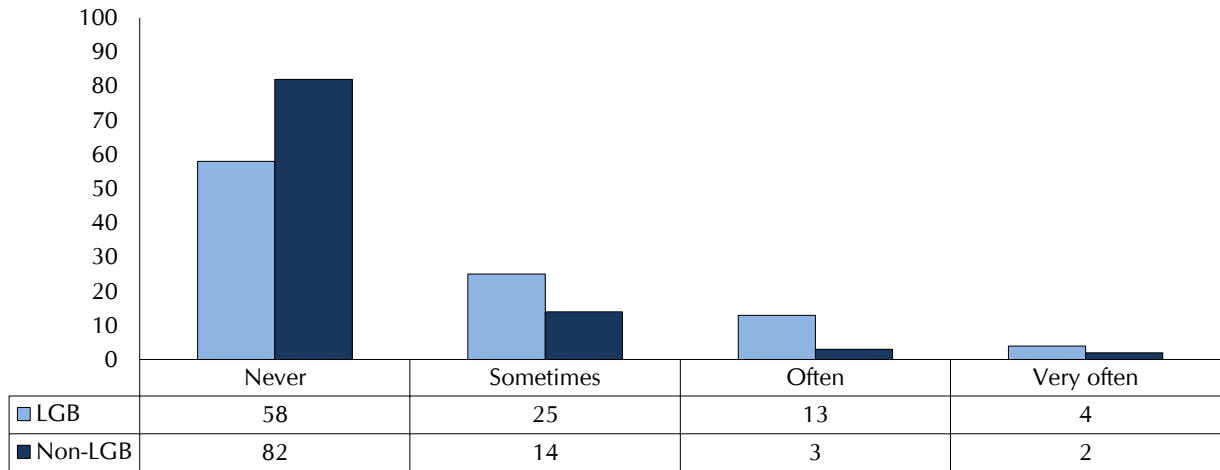

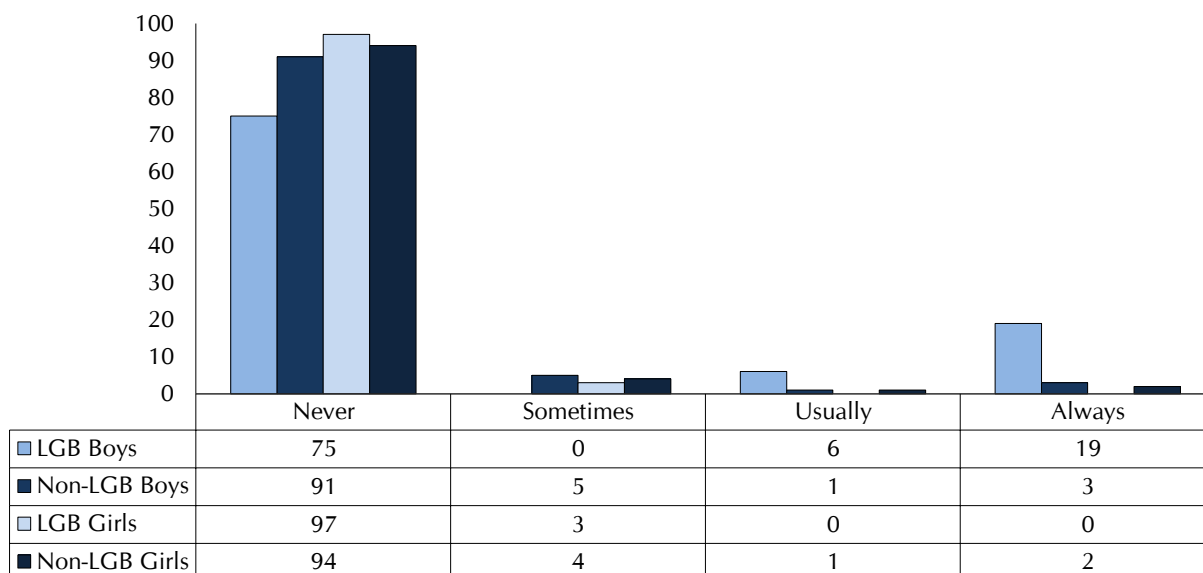

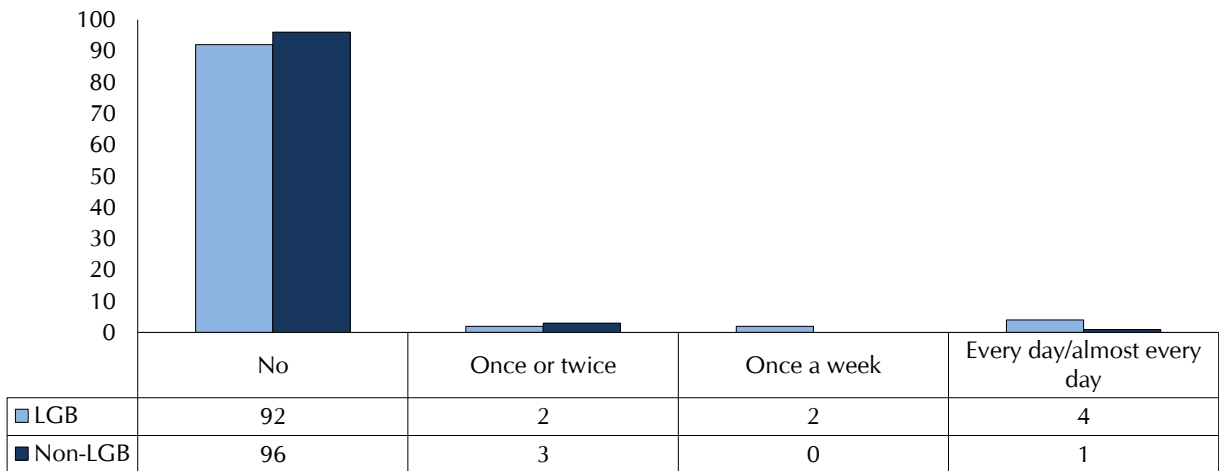

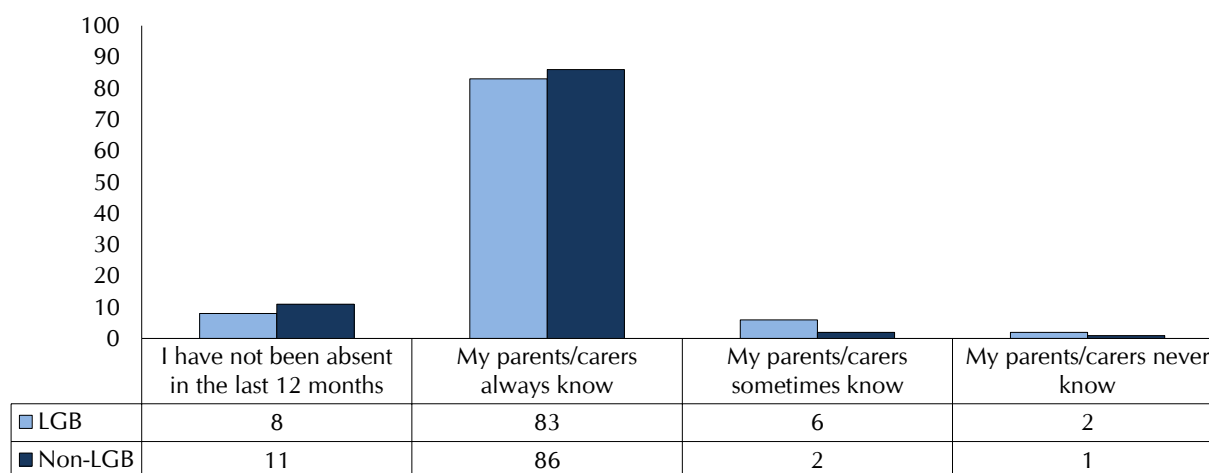

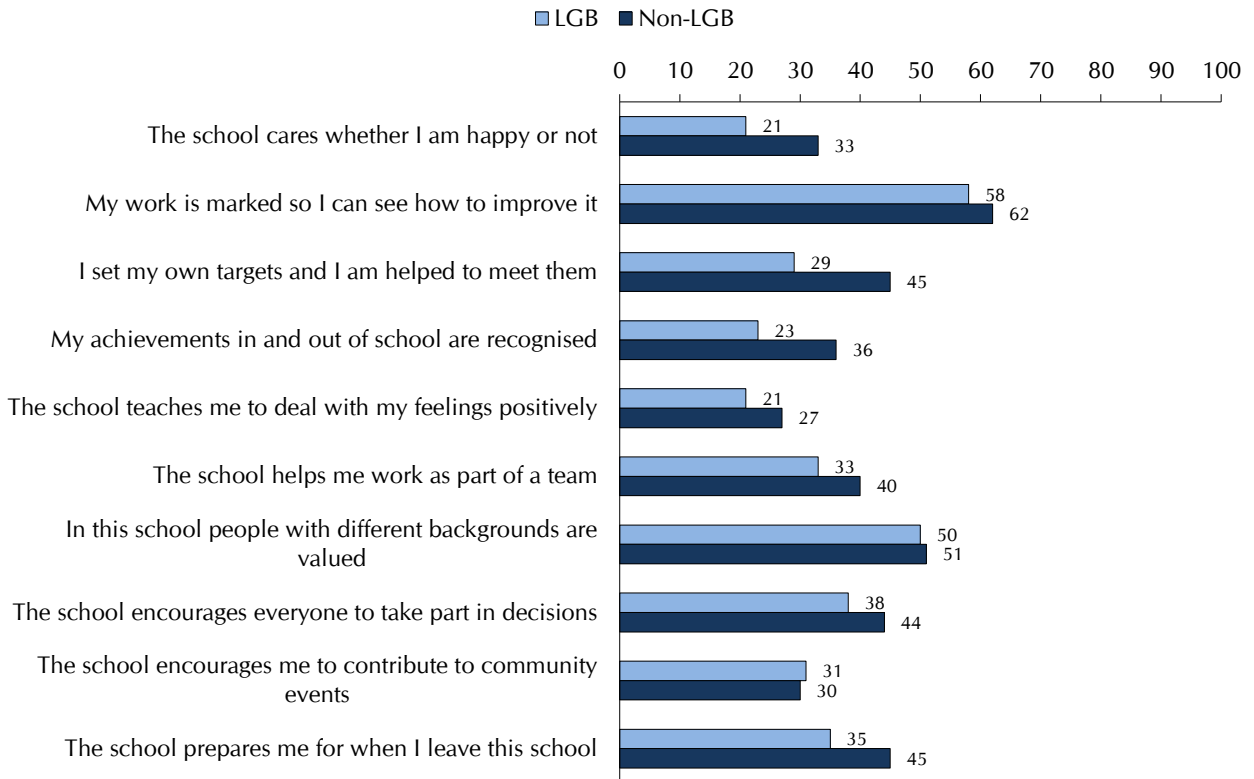

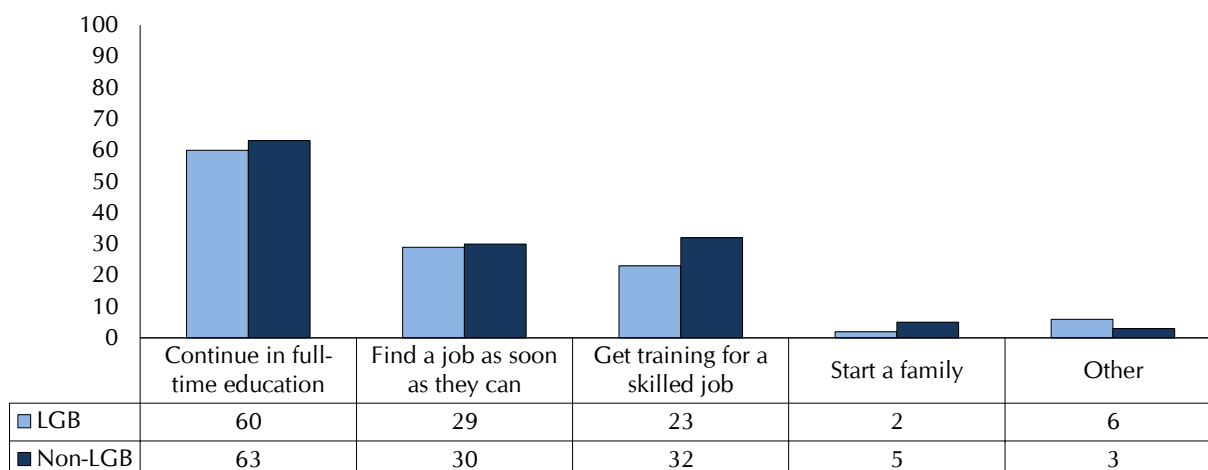

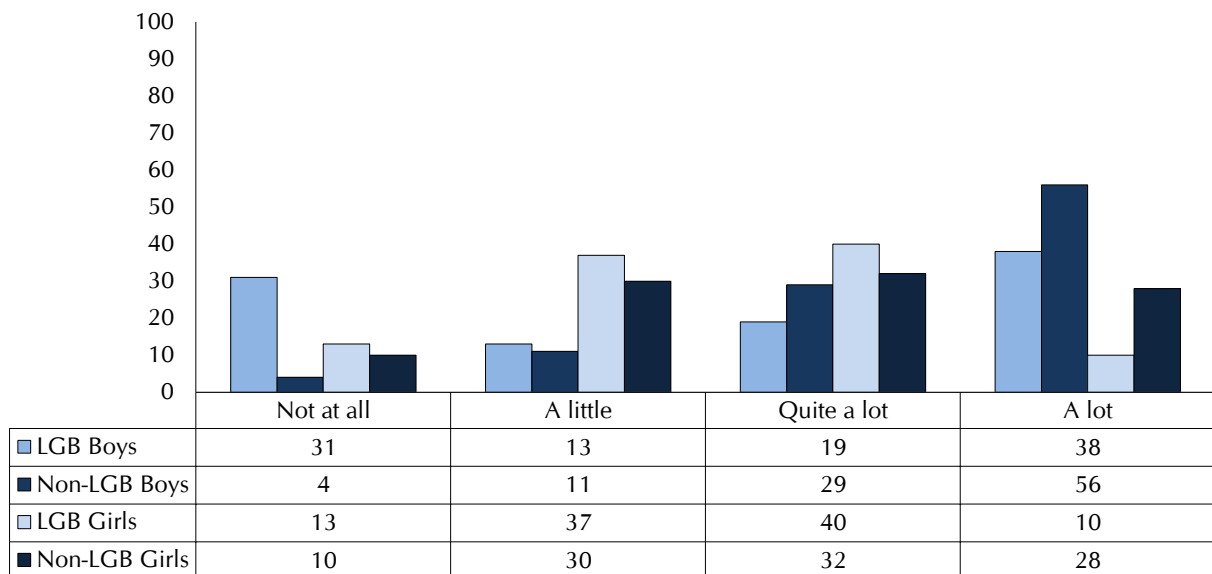

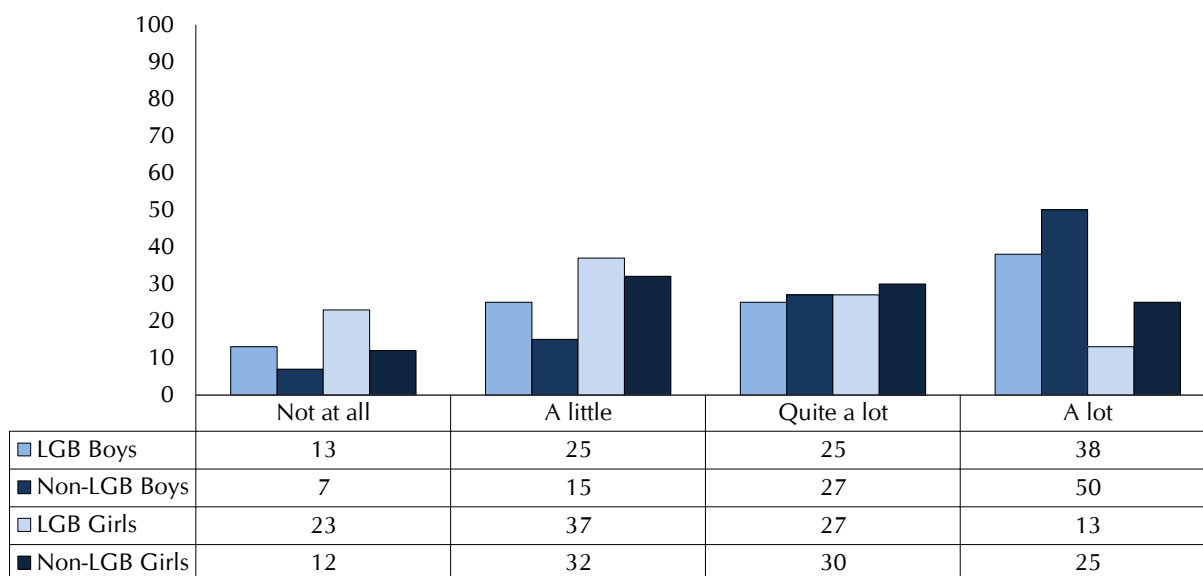

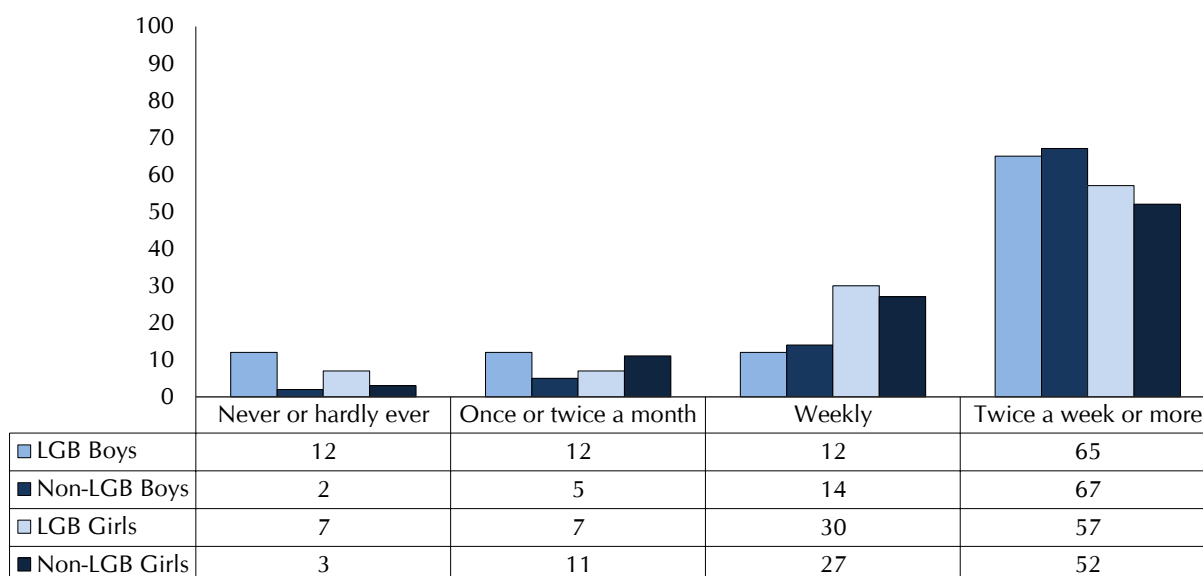

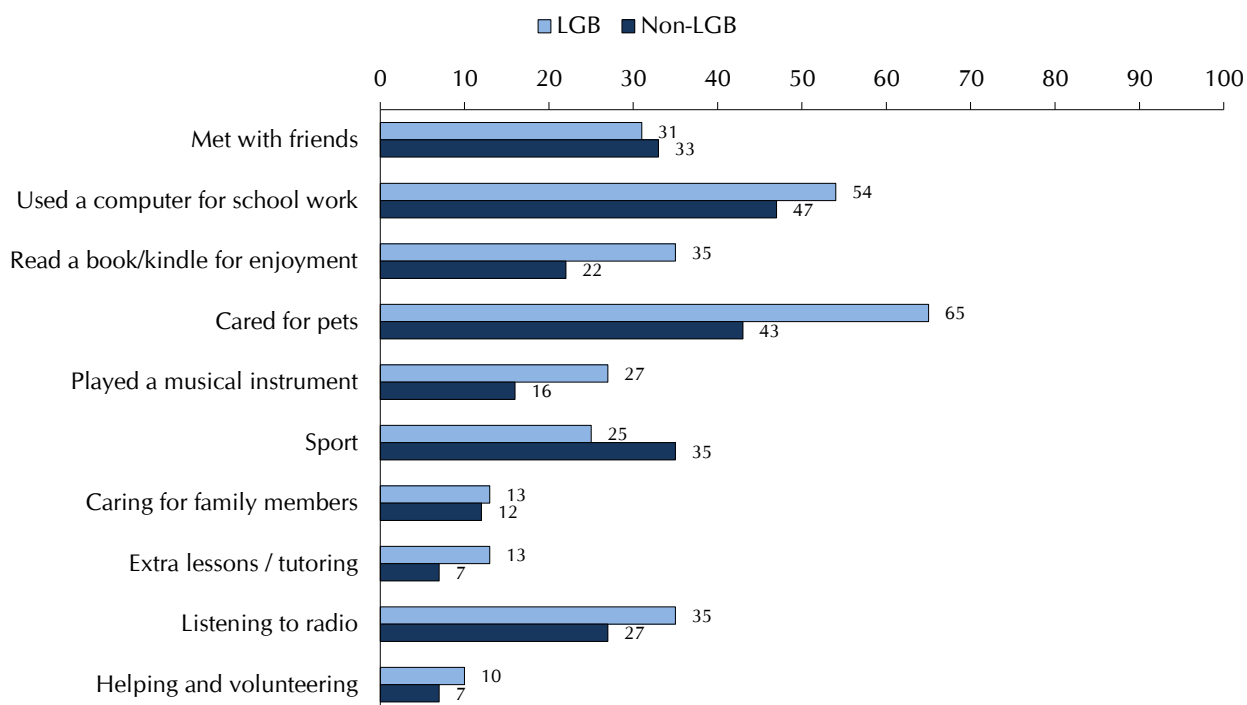
